





Minutes of the Special Election Convention

Saturday, August 6, 2016 Business Session

Pre-Convention Activities: Following Convention registration at 7:30 a.m. – 9:00 a.m., the Special Election Convention of the Diocese of Central New York took place at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Liverpool, New York.

Convention Session: Convention opened with the Celebration of the Holy Eucharist with the Right Reverend Gladstone B. Adams III, Presider and Preacher.

Call to Order: The Right Reverend Gladstone B. Adams III, Bishop of the Central New York Diocese, called the Special Convention to order at 10:30 a.m.

Quorum: Bishop Adams recognized Judy Fried, Secretary of Convention, for Certification of a Quorum. The Secretary of Convention reported, "pursuant to Canon II, Section 5, on the basis of registrations filed with me, I report that a quorum is in attendance. That is, at least 20 clerical members entitled to vote at Convention, and delegations from at least 20 parishes are present." The Convention Secretary reported that as of 9:30 a.m. that 73 clerical members entitled to vote in the Convention and delegations from 79 parishes were present at the opening of Convention.

Bishop Adams declared the Convention duly organized for business.

Bishop Adams noted the difference in the name badge colors: blue name badges designate clergy delegates who have voice and vote; yellow name badges indicate lay delegates who have voice and vote; pink name badges are for those who have voice but no vote; and those with clear name badges have no voice, no vote.

Introductions: Bishop Adams recognized and introduced those seated at the head table:

Additional Introductions: Bishop Adams introduced the interpreters for the deaf: Ms. Audrey Lunson and Ms. Trisha Schwartz

Convention Photographer: Bishop Adams introduced Ms. Sue Cenci, member of Trinity Church in Fayetteville, who served as Convention Photographer.

Credentials of Lay Delegates: Bishop Adams recognized Mr. Charles Moore, Chair of the Committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates, to present the report on Credentials of Lay Delegates:

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS OF LAY DELEGATES Special Convention – August 6, 2016

At this time, there are 81 parishes, 1 mission parish, and 1 college chapel potentially entitled to vote in this Special Convention for the election of the 11th Bishop of the Diocese of Central New York.

The Annual Parochial Report as required by Canon XXII-5 has been filed by each of those parishes.

All of those parishes are current in payments to the Church Pension Fund as required per Canon XIX-4.

All parishes, except as listed below, have satisfied the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment.

St. John's, Whitesboro

Having no open action as set forth in Canon XVIII-7, this parish cannot be given voice or vote at this special Convention.

Per Canon II-1, Parish Vestry certification of delegates is to be received by the Secretary of Convention as specified in Canon II-1. Three eligible parishes (St. Paul's, Constableville; Trinity, Constantia; and Grace, Waverly) plus The Episcopal Chapel at Cornell chose to submit no delegate certification.

There are also 4 Chapels entitled to voice but no vote. We welcome a representative from St. Lawrence, Alexandria Bay.

Rule of Order: Bishop Adams called on the Rev. Christine Day, President of the Standing Committee, to present the Rules of Order for the Special Convention.

The Rev. Day presented the Rules of Order for the Special Convention as printed and distributed to all delegates prior to Convention and included in Delegate folders.

Special Rules of Order for the Convention to Elect The 11th Bishop of the Diocese of Central New York Saturday, August 6, 2016 At the Holiday Inn Convention Center, Liverpool, NY

- 1. The Convention will begin with the celebration of Holy Eucharist at 9 a.m.
- 2. Only registered lay and clergy delegates, and interpreters for the hearing impaired will sit in the "Voting Delegate" section. Alternate delegates, officers of the Convention, lay members of the Standing Committee and Diocesan Board, lay members of the Search and Transition Committees, lay members of the Diocesan staff, tellers, guest and press will be seated in another section. Diocesan Communication Officer and assistants may be on the floor to perform their duties.
- 3. Following the Eucharist, the 10th Bishop of the Diocese of Central New York, who will be presiding will call the Convention to order.
- 4. The Secretary of Convention will report:
 - a. The presence of a quorum: twenty (20) clerical members of Convention and delegates from at least twenty (20) parishes and the Committee of Credentials of lay delegates shall also report.
 - b. The number of eligible delegates in attendance in both the lay and clerical order and the number of votes necessary for election in each order.
 - i. No delegate will be permitted to register after the report by the Secretary of Convention is made.
 - ii. Any delegate who leaves the Convention and can be replaced by an alternate delegate in attendance must first go to the Registration Table with the alternate delegate, notify a registrar of the change and enable the alternate to become a voting delegate. The registrar will then notify the Secretary of Convention of this change, which does not affect the number of eligible voters.
 - iii. Any delegate who leaves the Convention permanently and cannot be replaced by an alternate, must also first go to the Registration Table to notify a registrar that he or she is officially

leaving and return his or her method of voting. The registrar will then notify the Secretary of Convention, who then notifies the Bishop and Convention of the changes in the eligible delegates and the changes in the number of votes necessary.

- 5. The 10th Bishop shall appoint tellers.
- 6. The President of the Standing Committee will place into nomination the names of all the Candidates. The President of the Standing Committee will certify that all candidates have completed the same search or petition process and background checks. There will be no nominations from the floor.
- 7. Delegates and Guests are requested to put their electronic devices on silent or vibrate.
- 8. No campaign or other materials relating to any candidate shall be allowed at Convention except the materials supplied by Convention.
- 9. A Transition Committee Co-Chair and Head Teller shall announce and demonstrate the voting procedure and polling places for clergy and lay
 - a. A valid vote or ballot will only have ONE candidate selected.
 - b. An invalid vote or ballot will have no candidate or more than one candidate or a candidate who has withdrawn selected.
- 10. Prior to any vote or ballot, the Secretary of Convention shall announce the number of eligible delegates in attendance in both the lay and clerical order and the number of votes necessary for election in each order. A period of silence and listening for the Holy Spirit shall precede each vote or ballot.
- 11.Once the Head Teller has certified a vote or ballot's result, the Head Teller will notify the Bishop. The President of the Standing Committee and the Secretary of Convention. The Bishop will call the Convention back to order. The Head Teller will notify each Candidate's Shepherd. This should take no longer than ten (10) minutes.
 - a. Candidates can only be dropped from the voting or ballot at their own request;
 - b. If a Candidate chooses to withdraw, she or he must do so before the next voting or the Bishop calls for ballot. To withdraw the candidate first informs his or her Shepherd of the decision to withdraw and then affirms the withdrawal to the President of the Standing Committee via cell phone and e-mail.
 - c. Once the Bishop is satisfied that the Candidates have been notified, he will instruct the President of the Standing Committee to read the result of the previous vote. The results will be posted in a manner visible to all and on Diocesan website, Facebook and Twitter showing the results of each successive votes or ballots.
- 12. Election will occur when there is a simple majority (50%+1) vote of the eligible votes or ballots cast in both orders, clergy and lay, in the same vote or ballot.
- 13. It is a canonical requirement that all electing delegates, clergy and lay, sign the Testimonial of Election Sheets, located at the polling places, before they leave the Convention.
- 14. There will be a recess called for lunch by the Bishop if the Election has not occurred before lunchtime.

15. If by 5:15 pm the Electing Convention has not elected a Bishop, the 10th Bishop will call for a vote to continue voting until 5:45 pm. If there is still no election by 5:45 pm, the 10th Bishop will declare a recess until a date within one month when the Convention will reconvene (Saturday, August 27, 2016 at 9 a.m. at St. Paul's Church, Syracuse.)

Announcements: Bishop Adams recognized Judy Fried, Secretary of Convention, who made announcements. The Secretary of Convention made these announcements:

- Pointed out the Fire Exits;
- Reminded Delegates that if they had to leave the Convention, they should report to the Registrar at the Registration Table so that an accurate tally of voting delegates would be known for each round of voting;
- Alternate Delegates who replace voting delegates must report to the Registrar so the appropriate changes can be made to the eligible voters on the voting lists;
- No delegates shall be allowed to register (or change registration from Alternate Delegate to Delegate) once the Secretary of Convention announces the delegate totals for that round of voting;
- Prior to the announcement of the vote totals for each round, the Shepherd for each candidate shall come to the dais to receive the tally for the round. Shepherds will have approximately 10 minutes to contact their candidate with the result of each round of voting prior to the announcement of the vote totals:
- A part of the Election process includes a Testimonial that each voting delegate must sign. This Testimonial will be sent to the Presiding Bishop's Office once there is an election. Please be sure to sign the Testimonial at your voting station;
- On the inside of your delegate folder is a sticker that indicates each delegate's voting station number.

Slate of Candidates for the 11th Bishop: Bishop Adams recognized the Rev. Day, President of the Standing Committee, to present the candidates.

The Rev. Day told the Convention that each candidate had completed the same search or petition process and background checks. Each of the candidates has been property vetted and the Standing Committee has voted to approve these individuals as candidates for bishop-elect. The Rev. Day stated that no nominations would be received from the floor.

Bishop Adams recognized Mr. Charles Moore, Co-Chair of the Election, and Ms. Carol Forrester, Co-Chair of the Transition Committee, to describe the voting process and instruct delegates on the voting process and where stations were located for Clergy and Lay Delegates.

Ms. Forrester told Convention that voting would be done electronically using iPads. She indicated that at the end of each round of voting, the Election Co-Chair would confer with the Electronic Election Co-Chair to verify that the number of delegates voting matched the iPad tallies.

Mr. Moore instructed Convention members that when they arrived at their voting station, a teller would first locate their name on the voting list. Each delegate would then sign the Testimonial then move to the voting station where the delegate could touch the iPad screen, or use a stylus, and vote for the candidate they desired. Mr. Moore indicated that after selecting the name of the candidate, the voter must then touch the "Select Now" button to enter their vote. Mr. Moore indicated that touching the "Select Now" screen, a new screen would appear displaying the message "Thank You for Voting for Bishop", this message indicates a properly cast vote. To double-check the voting process Mr. Moore then stated that the second Teller would write the name of the voter on a separate list. Mr. Moore also explained that the order of the names of the candidates on the voting screen would randomly change after each vote. Mr. Moore invited those delegates needing assistance with voting to bring someone with them to help them vote and that there were Youth Delegates available to help if needed.

Bishop Adams then indicated that an election should occur when there is a simple majority (50% of votes cast plus one) achieved in each order.

Bishop Adams recognized the Secretary of Convention to report on the number of eligible delegates present and able to vote in Ballot # 1.

The Secretary reported the following number of eligible voting delegates as of 10:30 a.m.:

Bishop Adams announced that there was no election.

Bishop Adams recognized the Co-Chair of the Election, Mr. Charles Moore. Mr. Moore explained to Convention that the electronic voting had been very successful. However, Mr. Moore noted that there were three individuals who signed in and voted (two clergy; one lay) but their votes did not register. Mr. Moore reminded delegates that a vote is not counted if the voter does not push the "Select Now" button on the voting screen. He asked all voters to be sure to press firmly when they touch the "Select Now" button and to then watch and be sure the computer screen moved to the next page that said "Thank You for Voting". Mr. Moore indicated to Convention that the result of the last ballot was certified because the three votes would not have made an election.

Bishop Adams announced to Convention that two candidates had withdrawn their names from further consideration: The Rev. Dena Cleaver-Bartholomew and the Rev. Nora Smith. Bishop Adams called for prayers of thanksgiving to the Rev. Cleaver-Bartholomew and the Rev. Smith for allowing themselves to be a part of this discernment process.

There being no election, Bishop Adams announced that Convention would proceed to a second ballot and indicated that the names of the candidates who had withdrawn would not appear as an option on the voting screens.

Bishop Adams called on the Secretary of Convention to report the number of eligible voting delegates for the second ballot.

Bishop Adams announced that on the second ballot the Very Rev. Dr. DeDe Duncan-Probe was elected. Members of Convention responded with applause and joyful thanksgiving.

Standing Committee president, the Rev. Christine Day, told Convention that prior to the announcement that there was an election, she had spoken with the Very Rev. Dr. DeDe Duncan-Probe. The Rev. Day told Convention that during that phone conversation, the Rev. Dr. Duncan-Probe accepted the call to become the next bishop of the Diocese of Central New York. The Rev. Day then attempted to call the bishop-elect using her cell phone, which she placed on "speaker" so the Bishop-elect could share her acceptance with members of Convention. After several attempts to reach the Bishop-elect, the Rev. Day told Convention that the call was not connecting and apologized that we were not able to make a connection. Bishop Adams indicated to Convention that the Diocesan Communications Specialist, Ms. Meredith Sanderson, would be contacting the bBshop-elect via videophone and would be posting the video of her acceptance comments on the Diocesan website and Facebook page later in the day.

Bishop Adams offered prayers of thanksgiving for Bishop-elect Duncan-Probe as well as each of the candidates who were a part of the discernment process. Bishop Adams said that the Diocese was very blessed to have such fine candidates who were willing to be a part of the bishop discernment process. Bishop Adams thanked each candidate for their willingness to be a part of this Bishop Search process and asked members of Convention to keep each of them in their prayers.

Bishop Adams thanked all of the people who worked to make the election possible: the Standing Committee, the Search Committee, the Transition Committee, Shepherds, election officials, and Eucharist participants. Bishop Adams indicated that the list of people to thank was far too long to try to list each of the individuals involved.

Bishop Adams also thanked all of the members of Convention and people of the Diocese that he has worked with and shared ministry with over the past 15 years, Bishop Adams indicated that he would greatly miss the people of the Diocese of Central New York. Bishop Adams told Convention that he would continue to hold the Diocese, Bishop-elect Duncan-Probe, and all of the people in Central New York in his prayers.

The Rt. Rev. Gladstone B. Adams, III Address to the Special Election Convention

On the Occasion of the Election of the 11th Bishop of Central New York
The Transfiguration of Our Lord
August 6, 2016

I bet you think you are here to elect a bishop. Not so fast. We will do that in good time, but first we are here to glorify God and to do what we can to awaken our spirits to God's Spirit already residing in us. Or, to put it another way, we are here to open our hearts to the conversation of love and mercy that is always going on within the community of the persons of the Trinitarian God. That's what Jesus was doing on the holy mountain where he "went up to pray."

Today the Holiday Inn, Liverpool is our mountain. Come on. Use your imaginations! Like Jesus and Moses we come here to pray. Specifically, we come here to discern, to open our hearts to the movement of God among us and within us. I remind us that "to discern" literally means, "to sift."

Whenever I think of sifting I think of my father. He loved to garden and across the street from our house was a lush woods with deep, moist, dark topsoil as its bed. I used to love to watch him push his hands into the soil and lift it up and let it fall between his fingers. It had a sweet, aromatic, earthy fragrance that infused the air around us and drew me into the dust from which I was formed. He taught me that the nutrients of that rich black earth were being prepared for this moment over millennia.

For the gardens of azaleas and boxwoods and figs and roses, however, it needed further sifting. So he built a sifter, welding a large open-grid steel cage three feet by four feet mounted on legs into which one could shovel the earth taken by wheel barrel from the woods. A crank on the end would turn the entire contraption and when there were chunks inside that needed further breaking down, there was a second crank handle on the opposite end that rotated an interior forked blade that I would often turn in order to break up the clumps. As all of this spun on an axis, a very fine mound of transfigured soil would build up under the sifter that could be taken to the garden into which the various plant life would be placed and rooted.

I invite you to carry this image through the day. We have received many words written and spoken. We load it all into our sifters. Before us on a ballot are the names of five people of God in whom God delights, each of whom has placed him or herself before the Church for a sifting out. We must honor their humanity, take all that has been offered to us and place it into the sifter of our mind, heart and soul. Maybe we will even have to break up a clump or two along the way, mostly within ourselves, anything that would indicate our own heart-resistance to the Spirit's movement.

Please don't get me wrong. I am not saying that only one of the candidates is God's choice and we must figure out who that is. No. Each of the persons presented to us is a sacrament of God. They are a gift to us and, through the gifts they have manifested in faithful service to God and God's people over the years, are outward and visible signs of God's grace. We are being called to sift out which sacrament best serves us in this time of the life of our beloved diocese.


What we do now is, like Moses did, take off the veils that keep us from listening and seeing deeply into the heart of God and one another. We gaze upon the face of God as God gazes upon ours. We seek to be open to a quality of awareness that Jesus knew on the holy mount. He was completely and transparently in that moment, so drawn by grace, that he knew who he was as God's beloved and that he could place his trust in the One who called him forth.

So now be the sifter. Receive the richness of what has been placed in you and before you. Listen. Breathe. Keep silence. Hope. Love. Now, with Jesus, we pray...and somewhere along the way, we'll elect a bishop.

Journal of the 148th Annual Convention

Friday, November 11, 2016 Business Session: First Day

Pre-Convention Activities: The 148th Convention of the Diocese of Central New York, with the theme "Working Together," took place at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Liverpool, New York. Registration began at 2:00 p.m. in the Convention Center foyer. The Exhibit Hall, with over twenty exhibitors, was open in the Grand Ballroom throughout Convention.

Convention Session: Convention opened with a tribute to Veteran's Day, led by Lt. Col. Todd Bajakian and his children Hannah and Nathaniel, who are members of Trinity Church in Watertown. Prayers for the Armed Forces from the **Episcopal Church's Prayer Book for the Armed Services** were read.

Call to Order: The Rev. Christine Day, Chair of the Standing Committee of the Central New York Diocese and Chair of Convention, called the 148th Convention to order at 4:10 p.m.

Quorum: Chairwoman Day recognized Judy Fried, Secretary of Convention, for the Certification of a Quorum. The Secretary of Convention reported, "pursuant to Canon II, Section 5, on the basis of registrations filed with me, I report that a quorum is in attendance. Charles Moore reported:

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS OF LAY DELEGATES Presented at the 148th Convention – November 11, 2016

Since the 145th Convention, no parishes or chapels have closed. Therefore, the Diocese consists of 81 parishes, 1 mission, 1 college chapel, and 3 chapels with congregations for a <u>total of 86 representative delegations</u>. There are also 2 chapels without congregations.

All parishes, except as shown below, have satisfied the three Canonical requirements for full voice and vote participation in our annual Convention; specifically:

- Church Pension Funding per Canon XIX-4.
- Mandatory Diocesan Assessment payments per Canon XVIII-7.
- Completion of the Annual Parochial Report per Canon XXII-5.

St. John's, Whitesboro has not satisfied the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment. Having no open action as set forth in Canon XVIII-7, this parish cannot be given voice or vote at this convention.

Please be mindful that the Annual Parochial Report is required by BOTH the National Church Canon, I-6-1; AND our Diocesan Canon, XXII-5, with a clearly stated filing deadline of MARCH FIRST in both places. Confusion has arisen because of a May 1, deadline in the National Canon for the DIOCESE to forward the old hard-copy reports to the National Office. Since the establishment of electronic filing, that date is meaningless. The Annual Parochial Report filing deadline for ALL parishes and congregations is MARCH 1.

Across the Diocese, we are progressing at meeting this requirement – over ¾ of all reports were complete by mid-March. Thank you for your continuing cooperation.

Per Canon II-1, delegate certification is to be received by the Secretary of Convention before May 31st. Last November we pleaded for honoring this deadline because of the Special Convention in early August. Your response was wonderful!!! 90% of certifications were in by the first week in June. On behalf of the Diocesan Staff ---- THANK YOU!!

Three eligible parishes, (<u>St. Paul's, Constableville</u>; <u>Trinity, Constantia</u>; and <u>Grace</u>, <u>Waverly</u>); plus <u>The Episcopal Chapel at Cornell</u>, chose to submit no delegate certification.

Resolutions: Chairwoman Day called on the Rev. Georgina Hegney, Member of the Resolutions Committee, to introduce by title the pre-filed resolutions.

The Rev. Hegney read the titles of the Resolutions that had been pre-filed.

The Rev. Hegney issued the final call for resolutions and said additional resolutions would be accepted in written form and submitted to the Secretary of Convention as soon as possible.

The Rev. Kate Day, of the Anti-Racism Committee, asked if she would have time to submit a resolution later during Convention as she had not yet had time to discuss her resolution with the whole Committee. The Vice-Chancellor ruled the resolution would have to be submitted at this time or it could not be discussed during Convention. The Rev. Kate Day submitted the resolution to the Secretary of Convention.

No other new resolutions were received.

Chairwoman Day recognized the Rev. Dcn. Dorothy Pierce and Ms. Pat Kinney of the Global Mission Committee. The Rev. Dcn. Pierce and Ms. Kinney invited interested members of Convention to join the Global Mission group for lunch on Saturday to discuss global missions and to hear the stories of God at work in the lives of individuals from around the Diocese.

Chairwoman Day recognized the Rev. Richard Schaal and Ms. Carol Forrester, Co-Chairs of the Transition Committee, who reported on the work of the Transition Committee since the election of the next Bishop of the Diocese and the upcoming consecration.

Chairwoman Day introduced the Rev. Mark Giroux who led Convention in a brief "stretch break".

Chairwoman Day recognized the Rev. Perry Mouncey, the Diocesan representative to the Episcopal Relief and Development Fund (ER&D), for a presentation. Rev. Mouncey introduced a short film which told about the current work of ER&D and how the Episcopal Church helps with relief and development around the world.

Chairwoman Day introduced Ms. Melissa Spicer and Mr. Earl Fontenot, of Clear Path for Veterans, and invited them to tell Convention about the work they do at Clear Path. Ms. Spicer, who is a member at Christ Church in Manlius and the step-daughter of the late Rev. Fritz Mills, co-founded Clear Path for Veterans. Melissa, an experienced dog-trainer, used her skills of developing the benefits of positive reinforcement training to develop a service dog model using this as a method of therapy with veterans struggling with PTSD. Mr. Fontenot, a retired member of the U.S. Army, works with Clear Path as the Director of Programs and Services. Their presentation was followed by a video of the work that Clear Path does with Veterans.

Chairwoman Day introduced Mr. Thomas Williams of the Ft. Drum Chapter of the National Association of the 10th Mountain Division Association, who talked about the work of the National Association. Mr. Williams is a retired infantry first sergeant who re-enlisted and continues to work with Homeland Security protecting Chemicals of Interest. Mr. Williams is a member of Trinity Church in Watertown. The National Association of the 10th Mountain Division Association provides scholarship funds to children of Ft. Drum soldiers.

Financial Report: Chairwoman Day recognized Ms. Deb Smith, Treasurer of the Diocese, who gave the Financial Report of the Diocese. After her report, Ms. Smith invited questions regarding the Financial Report. The Treasurer said that copies of the 2015 Audited Financial Reports and the 2016 YTD Financial Reports were available at Convention for anyone who wanted a copy of them. The Treasurer's Report is included at the end of these minutes.

Budget Presentation: Chairwoman Day recognized **The Rev. Wanda Copeland of the Diocesan Board** who presented the 2017 budget as distributed in a mailing prior to Convention and was discussed at the pre-Convention Budget Hearings. Rev. Copeland told Convention that the budget was prepared by the Budget Committee of the Board and is categorized based on the Episcopal Church's "Five Marks of Mission".

The Rev. Wanda Copeland, moved the adoption of the 2017 Budget.

The Rev. Dr. Richard Laribee seconded the motion.

Chairwoman Day called for discussion on the budget.

There was no discussion of the budget. Chairwoman Day called for a vote to accept the 2017 Budget.

Vote passed.

2017 Budget adopted.

Chairwoman Day called on the Bishop-elect to come to the dais to make an announcement. As Bishop-elect DeDe Duncan-Probe came forward, she was greeted by Convention with a standing ovation and welcome. Bishop-elect DeDe thanked the members of Convention for the warm welcome she received. Bishop-elect DeDe told Convention that the budget that was just passed contained funding for a Youth Coordinator Team. The Bishop-elect announced to Convention that Mr. Tory Blum and

his wife Kristen Blum would be the people filling the Youth Coordinator Team.

The Rev. Dena Cleaver-Bartholomew asked to by recognized by the Chair to make a brief announcement. Chairwoman Day recognized her. The Rev. Cleaver-Bartholomew, Chair of the Anti-Racism Committee, announced two dates for training events for 2017: April 29th at Zion Church in Rome and May 20th at Trinity Church in Watertown.

Chairwoman Day recognized the Co-Chairs of the Election Committee to give the voting procedure to Convention and to indicate which ballot station members should go to cast their ballot. Mr. Bob Cooley and Mr. Charles Moore gave instructions to Convention. After the instructions were given, a member of Convention, the Rev. Georgina Hegney, addressed the Secretary of Convention to ask if the ballots, as presented, were correct. Upon review, it was determined that the Rev. Jennifer Kenna's name appeared on both ballot #7 (Triennial Meeting) AND ballot #8 (General Convention Deputy) on both the Clergy and Lay Ballots. The Secretary of Convention confirmed that this was an error and that Rev. Kenna's name should ONLY be on ballot #7 – Triennial Meeting of the Women of the Church.

Secretary Fried instructed all members of Convention to pull out their ballots and turn to page 8 and to strike out the name of The Rev. Jennifer Kenna.

Announcements: Chairwoman Day recognized the Secretary of Convention who made announcements.

Chairwoman Day closed the session with prayer and a dinner blessing.

Chairwoman Day indicated the Polls to be open for 30 minutes for Delegates to cast their ballots.

At 6:40 p.m., Convention was adjourned.

Saturday, November 12, 2016 Morning Business Second Day

Breakfast: A buffet breakfast was held in the Cotillion Ballroom, 7:00 - 8:30 a.m.

Convention Reconvened at 9 a.m. with Eucharist:

The Convention Eucharist Service was prepared by the Rev. Joell Szachara, with the Rev. Christine Day as the Celebrant and the Rev. Carrie Schofield-Broadbent, Preacher. Mr. Jason Comet was the organist and Mr. Kip Coerper was the choirmaster for a choir of volunteer singers who represented parishes throughout the Diocese.

The Convention offering was designated to Clear Path for Veterans and to the Ft. Drum Chapter of the National Association of 10th Mountain Division. The Convention Offering of \$2295 and was divided between the two groups.

Chairwoman Day reconvened the 148th Convention and called the session back to order after the Eucharist Service at 10:45 a.m.

Chairwoman Day recognized Bishop-elect DeDe Duncan-Probe and invited her to lead a conversation with members of Convention. Bishop-elect DeDe first introduced her husband, Christopher Probe, and her children, Ryan and Grace, who were in attendance at Convention. Bishop-elect DeDe told Convention members that she had been answering questions from people of the Diocese for the past 4 months and now she wanted to hear from the people of the Diocese. Bishop-elect invited members of Convention to come to a microphone and tell her "what is the joy in your work and ministry"? Members of Convention spent the next hour telling the Bishop-elect about who they are and the ministry in their life that brings personal joy to them.

The Bishop-elect then thanked members of the Diocese for the work that they had done over the last year to be involved with the Diocese and to take part in the Search Committee Profile development, attend the Walk-Abouts to get to know the Bishop Candidates, and to attend the special Convention to elect a new bishop. The Bishop-elect then called upon the staff of the Diocese to come forward to be recognized for the extra effort and work of the staff over the last year and thanked them for their hard work.

Chairwoman Day recessed Convention for lunch until 1:00 p.m.

At 1:05 p.m., Chairwoman Day called the Convention back to order.

Chairwoman Day called on Ms. Helen O'Neill, of the Mission of Miracles to give a presentation. Ms. O'Neill, who is on the Planning Board of the Mission of Miracles, told Convention about the work of the Medical Mission in the Companion Diocese in El Salvador.

Chairwoman Day called on the Rev. Dcn. Chuck Stewart to do a presentation on the Companion Diocese of El Salvador. Deacon Stewart, welcomed Bishop Alvarado and initially addressed Convention in Spanish. Deacon Stewart continued on in English telling Convention about the on-going work between the Diocese of Central New York and the Diocese of El Salvador. Deacon Stewart reminded Convention that later in the afternoon Convention would be voting to extend the Companion relationship between the two Dioceses. Deacon Stewart then introduced the Bishop of El Salvador.

Chairwoman Day invited Bishop Juan David Alvarado to address Convention. Bishop Alvarado's address can be found at the end of these minutes. Bishop Alvarado invited all members of Convention to their Diocesan Convention on June 9 and 10, 2017. Bishop Alvarado told Convention that he sends his prayers to Bishop Skip and Bonnie Adams for their continued ministry.

Chairwoman Day recognized Ms. Meredith Kadet Sanderson, Communication Specialist in the Diocese, to report on the communications activities in the Diocese. Ms. Sanderson reported on the variety of ways used over the past year to communicate information during the bishop search and election process.

Chairwoman Day invited the Rev. Mark Giroux to lead Convention in a stand-up break.

Memorials and Prayers for the Deceased:

Chairwoman Day referred members of Convention to their folders for the Memorial List of names of parish members and clergy who have been active in the Diocese and have died since the last Convention.

Clergy Memorials for 2016:

Chairwoman Day recognized the Secretary of Convention to read resolutions regarding Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the Episcopal Church as required at each Diocesan Convention before the final vote at the 79th General Convention in 2018. The reading of these Amendments is required to be reported and certified with the Secretary of the General Convention. (The complete contents of each Resolution can be found at the end of these minutes.)

Resolution B011 – Amend Article II.7 Resolution D003 – Amend Article V Resolution D008 – Amend Article I.1

Resolutions Committee: Chairwoman Day recognized the Rev. Georgina Hegney for the report of the Resolutions Committee. Chairwoman Day reminded Convention that persons entitled to the privilege of the floor may speak to a resolution twice, with a 5-minute limit each time. There will be a warning bell with two rings at 4 minutes and an ending bell at 5 minutes (*General Rules of Order IV.K*). Members were asked to abide by the bells. Chairwoman Day also reminded delegates that in order to speak you must go to a microphone and state your name and the name of your parish. A delegate must also go to a microphone to second a motion or call the question.

The Rev. Hegney presented the following resolutions to Convention for consideration and action:

RESOLVED, that each parish consider a minimum cost of living increase of 2.1% for each member of the clergy and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clergy Compensation and Benefits Policy and Handbook, previously ratified by Convention in *2015* be the resource and guide for the Wardens and Vestries of this Diocese when dealing with their clergy and compensation.

CLERGY COMPENSATION AND BENEFITS POLICY AND HANDBOOK

The following tables, containing guidelines for compensation of clergy in this Diocese, be used in the call process and in negotiations and review of the Letter of Agreement as ratified by Convention 2016.

There will be a regular mutual ministry review of the parish by the clergy, wardens and vestry. That there will be an annual salary and benefit review to ensure appropriate compensation. Such review should take into account the most recent Clergy Compensation Resolution adopted by Convention and that each parish considers a minimum cost of living increase for each member of the clergy as passed by Resolution.

That parish classification is used as a tool to reflect the size, scope and complexity of the clergy person's responsibility.

Parishes are classified by indexing three statistics from the Parochial Report: Communicants in Good Standing (CGS), Average Sunday Attendance (ASA), and Normal Operating Income (NOI). The calculated index is a single number that types a parish as I, II, III or IV.

A salary range is provided for each parish Type. The range enables a parish to call a new priest and to recognize existing clergy's performance and length of service.

FULL-TIME CLERGY

The clergy shall be paid at least the minimum base cash salary for the appropriate Salary range

The following additional benefits will be part of the total compensation for all full-time clergy:

- 1. Half of the self-employment tax liability (currently 15.3%) on the following amounts: (cash salary + fair rental value of rectory + utilities) if church owned housing is provided, or (cash salary + cash housing allowance) if church owned housing is not provided. The Diocesan Board shall undertake the implementation of any revisions or change of laws that affect employee contributions in self-employment tax as they may relate to clergy as part of clergy reimbursement.
- 2. If housing is provided, the priest shall have full and exclusive use of the property.
- 3. Reimbursement for all tolls, parking fees and mileage at current IRS rate.
- 4. Participation in one of the Denominational Health Plans available in the Diocese, unless the cleric elects the Employee Opt Out Option provided b the Denominational Health Plan Model.
- 5. Participation in Workers' Compensation insurance.
- 6. The following periods of leave at full compensation:
 - A. <u>Annual Vacation</u> of four weeks, including five Sundays. Vacation time shall not be cumulative and may not be carried forward into a succeeding year, unless by previous arrangement under extenuating circumstances, as arranged with and approved by the Wardens.
 - B. New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Birthday, Presidents' Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas to be taken in cooperation with the needs of the parish as negotiated with the wardens.
 - C. <u>Professional Development Leave</u> at the rate of two weeks per year, including one Sunday.
 - D. The Rector shall be eligible for a <u>Sabbatical time</u> after the sixth year of service, and every sixth year thereafter. A Sabbatical time is three (3) months in length, and not more than (4) months, if the Rector elects to append/his/her vacation time to extend the Sabbatical for the fourth month. It is agreed that, following a sabbatical, the Rector will remain in his/her position for at least twelve months. The Rector must notify the Bishop six (6) months prior to taking a Sabbatical leave.
 - E. <u>Clergy Sick Leave Policy</u> If illness or injury inhibits the rector's performance or causes the rector to be absent on a Sunday morning, a warden shall be notified. The wardens are to be dually concerned with the rector and parish's health. If repeated or chronic absence of the rector becomes a factor in the life of the parish, then the rector, a warden or both shall notify the Bishop.
- 7. An equity allowance over and above stated compensation for clergy residing in church-owned housing in order to reduce the adverse economic impact of not accumulating equity in a house.
- 8. Relocation expenses at a cost not to exceed the estimate provided by the moving company contracted by the Diocese.

PART TIME CLERGY

The part-time clergy shall be paid at least the minimum base cash salary for the appropriate salary range multiplied by the percentage defined in the letter of agreement.

The following additional benefits will be part of the total compensation for all part-time clergy:

- 1. Half of the self-employment tax liability (currently 15.3%) on the following amounts: (cash salary + fair rental value of rectory + utilities) if church owned housing is provided, or (cash salary + cash housing allowance) if church owned housing is not provided. The Diocesan Board shall undertake the implementation of any revisions or change of laws that affect employee contributions in self-employment tax as they may relate to clergy as part of clergy reimbursement.
- 2. If housing is provided, the priest shall have full and exclusive use of the property.
- 3. Reimbursement for all tolls, parking fees and mileage at current IRS rate.
- 4. Participation in one of the Denominational Health Plans available in the Diocese, for those who are eligible for health insurance, unless the cleric elects the Employee Opt Out Option provided by the Denominational Health Plan Model. The minimum contribution by the parish shall equal the contribution for the available Standard Health Plan times the percentage used in determining cash salary.
- 5. Participation in Workers' Compensation insurance.
- 6. The following periods of leave at full compensation:
 - A. <u>Annual Vacation</u> of four weeks, including five Sundays. Vacation time shall not be cumulative and may not be carried forward into a succeeding year, unless by previous arrangement under extenuating circumstances, as arranged with and approved by the Wardens.
 - B. New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Birthday, Presidents' Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas to be taken in cooperation with the needs of the parish as negotiated with the wardens.
 - C. <u>Personal Development Leave</u> at the rate of two weeks per year, including one Sunday.
 - D. The Rector shall be eligible for a <u>Sabbatical time</u> after the sixth year of service, and every sixth year thereafter. A Sabbatical time is three (3) months in length, and not more than (4) months, if the Rector elects to append /his/her vacation time to extend the Sabbatical for the fourth month. It is agreed that, following a sabbatical, the Rector will remain in his/her position for at least twelve months. The Rector must notify the Bishop six (6) months prior to taking a Sabbatical leave.
 - E. <u>Clergy Sick Leave Policy</u> If illness or injury inhibits the rector's performance or causes the rector to be absent on a Sunday morning, a warden shall be notified. The wardens are to be dually concerned with the rector and parish's health. If repeated or chronic absence of the rector becomes a factor in the life of the parish, then the rector, a warden or both

shall notify the Bishop.

- 7. An equity allowance over and above stated compensation for clergy residing in church-owned housing in order to reduce the adverse economic impact of not accumulating equity in a house.
- 8. Relocation expenses at a cost not to exceed the estimate provided by the moving company contracted by the Diocese.

PARISH PRIEST

This title replaces "long-term supply". It is used when the cleric has fewer responsibilities than either full or part time clergy and the cleric is the only one the parish has. There should be a written agreement specifying the expectations of the cleric and of the parish both as to duties and compensation. Here are some of the issues to be considered. Is the cleric responsible only for Sunday services? Weddings? Funerals? Pastoral and/or administrative duties. If the latter, what kinds and is there a limit on the number of hours a week? The following compensation table should guide the amount of compensation provided.

The following be established as minimum compensation for a Parish Priest:

One service: \$130 Two services same day: \$155 Three services same day: \$180

Pastoral/Admin Care: \$ 55 an hour

Travel reimbursement at IRS rate

Guidelines for implementing Parish Priest compensation:

Since these are minimum amounts, clergy and parishes may negotiate higher rates.

Weddings:

\$130 for the wedding service.

\$55 per hour for marriage preparation

\$105 for the rehearsal

Travel reimbursement

Each parish is encouraged to determine whether or not to pass these fees along to those being married.

Funerals:

\$130 for the service

\$55 per hour for pastoral work and service preparation with the family Travel reimbursement

Any fee from the funeral home gets subtracted from the above fees; any honorarium from the family does not.

SUPPLY CLERGY

Normally, this situation occurs when regular parish clergy are on vacation or otherwise unavailable for services. Parish clergy and supply clergy should discuss in advance whether or not the supply would provide pastoral/administrative care in addition to services. If the supply cleric is replacing one parish cleric who takes services at more than one place on the same day, the multiple service rates below apply.

The following be established as minimum compensation for Supply Clergy:

One service: \$130 Two services same day: \$155 Three services same day: \$180

Pastoral/Admin Care: \$ 55 an hour

Travel reimbursement at IRS rate

Guidelines for implementing supply clergy compensation:

Since these are minimum amounts, clergy and parishes may negotiate higher rates.

Weddings:

\$130 for the wedding service.

\$55 per hour for marriage preparation

\$105 for the rehearsal

Travel reimbursement

Each parish is encouraged to determine whether or not to pass these fees along to those being married.

Funerals:

\$130 for the service

\$55 per hour for pastoral work and service preparation with the family Travel reimbursement

Any fee from the funeral home gets subtracted from the above fees; any honorarium from the family does not.

Chairwoman Day moved these nominations be accepted and asked for a second. The Rev. Kate Day seconded the motion. Chairwoman Day called for discussion. Chairwoman Day called for a vote. Motion Carried Approved and passed.

Unfinished Business: The Chairwoman asked the Secretary of Convention if there was any unfinished business; no unfinished business was reported by the Secretary. The Chairwoman asked members of Convention if there was unfinished business.

The Rev. Kate Day noted that she had withdrawn the resolution that she presented the prior day. However, the Rev. Day said the Anti-Racism Committee will continue to refine the resolution for presentation at a later time.

The Rev. Ginger Nagel said she was concerned about the paper in her folder from the 144th Convention regarding poverty. The Rev. Nagel said she thought a conversation of this topic should not be buried in the papers in Delegate folders. The Rev. Nagel's comments prompted other delegates to comment on the resolution. Ms. Ernestine Patterson, delegate from Grace Church in Syracuse, said she believes the entire Convention dealt with "the effect of our meeting on poverty." Several other delegates indicated the resolution should be "front and center" at the beginning of Convention.

Announcements: Chairwoman Day recognized the Secretary of Convention who made announcements.

Remarks of Appreciation: Chairwoman Day referred members to the list in Delegate folders with the names of people who helped with the arrangements for Convention. The Chairwoman noted that the list was too long and she regretted that she could not recognize each person individually. Chairwoman Day noted that without the time and assistance of each of these individuals, Convention would not be possible. Chairwoman Day apologized in advance for any names that might be missing and

inadvertently omitted. It was noted that Ms. Ernestine Patterson's name was omitted in error from the Resolution recognizing members of the Transition Committee.

Reminders: Chairwoman Day reminded members of Convention that 149th Convention will be held on November 10 & 11, 2017, at the Holiday Inn. Chairwoman Day also made note that the new bishop will preside as the Chair of that Convention!

Adjourn: Chairwoman Day adjourned Convention at 3:06 p.m. with a closing prayer with the Deacons (led by Dcn. Shelly Banner).

RESOLUTIONS REFERRED TO DIOCESES FROM THE 78TH GENERAL CONVENTION January 1, 2016

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS, FIRST READING

The following Constitutional amendments shall be read by the Secretary of the Diocesan Convention preceding the final vote at the 79th General Convention in 2018, such reading to be certified by the Diocesan Convention with the Secretary of the General Convention.

Bo11: Amend Article II.7

Resolved, That the Constitution of the General Convention (2012) Article II.7 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. It shall be lawful for tThe House of Bishops-to may elect a Suffragan-Bishop Suffragan who, under the direction of the Presiding Bishop, shall be in charge of the work of those persons of this Church who serve as chaplains in the Armed Forces of the United States, and such other agencies as may be specified by the Presiding Bishop. The Suffragan-Bishop Suffragan so elected shall be ordained and consecrated and hold office under such conditions and limitations other than those provided in this Article as may be provided by Canons of the General Convention. The Suffragan Bishop shall be eligible for election as Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor or Suffragan Bishop of a Diocese.

Doo3: Amend Article V

Resolved, That Article V, Section 1 is amended to read as follows:

A new Diocese may be formed, with the consent of the General Convention and under such conditions as the General Convention shall prescribe by General Canon or Canons, (1) by the division of an existing Diocese; (2) by the junction of two or more Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses; or (3) by the erection into a Diocese of an unorganized area evangelized as provided in Article VI. The proceedings shall originate in a Convocation of the Clergy and

Laity of the unorganized area called by the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority for that purpose; or, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority, in the Convention of the Diocese to be divided; or (when it is proposed to form a new Diocese by the junction of two or more existing Dioceses or of parts of two or more Dioceses) by mutual agreement of the Conventions of the Dioceses concerned, with the approval of the Bishop Ecclesiastical Authority of each Diocese. In case the Episcopate of a Diocese be vacant, no proceedings toward its division shall be taken until the vacancy is filled. After consent of the General Convention, when a certified copy of the duly adopted Constitution of the new Diocese, including an unqualified accession to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, shall have

been filed with the Secretary of the General Convention and approved by the Executive Council of this Church, such new Diocese shall thereupon be in union with the General Convention.

Doo8: Amend Article I.1

Resolved, That Article I, Section 1 of the Constitution is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1. There shall be a General Convention of this Church, consisting of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies, which Houses will sit, debate, and vote separately, unless otherwise provided for by this Constitution or the Canons. The Houses by majority vote of each House may call for the Houses to sit, debate, and vote, or any combination thereof, together. The General Convention may by Canon establish procedures for such sessions. In all deliberations freedom of debate shall be allowed. Either House may originate and propose legislation, and all acts of the Convention shall be adopted and be authenticated by both Houses.

The Rev. Robert Hanna Beveridge 1932-2016

The Rev. Robert "Bob" Beveridge died in Seattle on September 2, 2016 at the age of 84. He is survived by his beloved wife Berta; three sons Paul, Bill and Don; and two grandsons, Mack and Liam. His fourth son, David, died at age 22 in 1994.

Born on July 11, 1932 in Richmond, Virginia, he attended South Kent School, St. Lawrence University, Emory University and the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. Bob met Berta while serving on a USAF radar site in British Columbia. They were married in Vancouver in 1959. He served as a B-52 commander. The apex of his career with SAC was flying airborne alert during the Cuban Missile Crisis. His experience with the cold war led him to become a nuclear disarmament activist in later life. He resigned from active duty when he felt the call to become an Episcopal priest, but continued to serve 20 years as a chaplain in the reserves, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Bob's primary calling was as a parish priest. Ordained a priest in 1970, his ministry took him to Sacramento, California; Moscow, Idaho; Beaverton, Oregon; Arlington, Virginia and Fayetteville, New York. A champion for inclusivity, he was a strong advocate for the ordination of women as priests in the Episcopal Church, as well as for lay people serving at the altar as assisting ministers. An avid singer, Bob loved the Episcopal hymn book and leading his congregations in hymns.

He retired in 1994 and traveled for nine years throughout North America with Berta in their RV. When they finally parked the RV, they settled in the Madrona neighborhood of Seattle, near their son, Paul, and their grandsons. Bob and Berta were happy to be among the first residents at Skyline on First Hill in Seattle. Until Bob was stricken with Parkinson's disease, he was active in Skyline political and singing groups. He and his family are very grateful to the staff at the Terraces at Skyline who cared for him during his struggles with Parkinson's.

Bob's life was celebrated at St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle on Saturday, September 10th. A sweet and tender man, he was loved by many and will be greatly missed. The world is a better place because Bob Beveridge lived.

The Rev. S. George Dirghalli 1926 – 2016

The Rev. S. George "Doc" Dirghalli, 89, of Syracuse, died Saturday, October 29, 2016. George was a veteran of the US Navy and served in the South Pacific in WWII. He was a graduate of The University of Florida, and The Episcopal Divinity School at Harvard University.

After his service in the Navy and graduation from the University of Florida, George began working for Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity in 1951 beginning 65 years of Service to the fraternity. He held many positions in those 65 years including serving as the organization's international president from 1978-1982. For the past 30 years Doc served as the fraternity's spiritual guide and was a mentor, brother and friend to thousands.

Fr. George was ordained as an Episcopal priest in 1964 and served Calvary Episcopal Church in Syracuse, NY, from 1968 until his retirement in 1988. In retirement he continued to serve the Episcopal Community as Chaplain to retired clergy and coordinator for Provinces I & II.

He is survived by his wife Kira Dirghalli; children Elisabeth (Dean) Swenson and Stefan (Kelly) Dirghalli; brother Moes Dirghalli; and his grandchildren Benjamin and Kira Dirghalli and Paul and Alex Swenson.

The Very Rev. Charles G. Taylor 1951 – 2016

The Very Reverend Charles G. Taylor "Father Chuck" 64 yrs. old of New Berlin, NY, rector

of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, New Berlin and St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, South New Berlin and Priest of Emmanuel Episcopal Church, Norwich, NY, passed away as a result of a tragic accident on April 16, 2016 at his cottage on Chenango Lake, NY.

Fr. Chuck was born on October 12, 1951 at Miner's Hospital in Spangler, PA, son of the late H. and D. Lois Taylor (Urbain). He grew up in Barnesboro, PA where his family owned and operated Taylor's Bakery. Among his early memories were delivering bread with his grandfather. While growing up he attended Sunday school and served as an Acolyte at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church, which was founded by the Taylor family. By the age of seven, Fr. Chuck knew that he wanted to be a priest. He graduated from Northern Cambria High School in 1969 where he played football, baseball and ran track. He also served as a member of the Hope Fire Company in Barnesboro.

On January 1, 1972, Fr. Chuck and his wife Donna (Abrams) were married at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church and started their life together in Pittsburgh, with Bishop Appleyard's blessing. He attended the University of Pittsburgh and pursued degrees in Psychology and Sociology, while Donna attended Bradford Business School in Pittsburgh. While in Pittsburgh, the young couple were active at the Church of Ascension in Oakland. As a Postulant preparing for seminary, Fr. Chuck was privileged to train under the direction of Dr. William Bradbury and Fr. Dougherty. He was given the unique opportunity to give sermons which were broadcasted on live radio.

After graduating from the University of Pittsburgh, he worked for a year on the railroad (to save money for seminary) while also doing a one-year internship at St. Mark's

Episcopal Church in Johnstown, PA, under the direction of The Reverend Park Allis. He entered Bexley Hall Seminary in Rochester, New York in the fall of 1974, graduating with his Master of Divinity degree on May 5, 1979. One of the highlights of their stay in Rochester began in 1977 when Fr. Chuck was accepted as a "seminarian in training" at the Church of Ascension under the direction of The Reverend Albert Mahan.

While serving the Church of Ascension, Fr. Chuck and Donna's first son, Scott Charles Taylor, was born on October 18, 1978. It was an honor and privilege for Fr. Chuck to assist Fr. Mahan in baptizing their son Scott. Fr. Chuck was ordained as a Deacon in the Diocese of Pittsburgh on June 9, 1979, and ordained as Priest on December 8, 1979. In the Fall of 1979, Bishop Appleyard asked him to return to the Diocese of Pittsburgh to serve St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Barnesboro, PA (his hometown church), and St. Luke's Lutheran-Episcopal Church in Patton, PA. While serving in PA, Brett Aaron Taylor was born on August 17, 1982, and was baptized at St. Thomas' Church by Bishop Appleyard.

On Palm Sunday, March 24, 1985, Fr. Chuck and his family accepted a position at St. Andrew's and St. Matthew's churches in New Berlin and South New Berlin, NY. He celebrated his 25th year serving the parishes in 2010. In honor of his 25 years, a gift of a cruise to Alaska was given. Seven years ago Fr. Chuck became active in the pursuit of regional ministry. Emmanuel Church in Norwich was added to the churches he served. Many church activities are now a combination of all three churches. Fr. Chuck divided his time between New Berlin, South New Berlin and Norwich.

During his ministry Fr. Chuck faithfully served not only the three churches but also the communities and surrounding areas. He was proud to call his service to the community a "street ministry." Fr. Chuck has performed innumerable marriages, funerals and baptisms for both parishioners, their families and others. His ministry to the elderly and local nursing homes was very important to him; he loved them and they loved him in return. Fr. Chuck had a special passion for feeding the hungry and bringing the communities together. He ran the Unadilla Food Pantry housed at St. Andrew's in New Berlin and started the free meal sponsored by area churches known as Chit, Chat & Chew. Fr. Chuck was instrumental in starting the Emmanuel Soul Kitchen which provides a free meal once a month at Emmanuel Church in Norwich. He spoke fondly of the people who attended.

Throughout his tenure, he served on numerous committees of the Episcopal Diocese of Central New York. Since 2010 he has served as the Diocesan Dean of the Chenango District. In addition to his church activities, Fr. Chuck served as chaplain of the New Berlin Fire Department and chaplain of the football prep school Milford Academy. In the summer months he loved umpiring baseball games at Doubleday field in Cooperstown, NY. Fr. Chuck loved what he did and the people he served.

Fr. Chuck was a beloved husband, father and granddad. His family was his pride and

joy and he counted his blessings every day. He and his wife Donna of 44 years loved music, dancing, taking long walks with his beloved dog Coal, and spending time at their cottage at Chenango Lake. Fr. Chuck had a passion for hunting, fishing and the shooting sports. He cherished the time he spent afield with his sons Scott and Brett, teaching them the tools of the trade and taking in the beauty of the outdoors. He loved his bird hunts with Coal dog and his yearly pilgrimage to western PA to deer hunt with his cousin Larry and family.

Fr. Chuck's seven year old granddaughter Lyla June Taylor was the apple of his eye. At a very young age she would visit shut-ins and local nursing home residents with her devoted granddad. Charles G. Taylor was predeceased by his parents, Charles H. & D. Lois Taylor, infant brother, Wayne, & nephew Nicholas Paronish. He is survived by his wife Donna Taylor (Abrams), son Scott and partner Benjamin Orcutt, son Brett and fiancée Jeanette Ray, and granddaughter, Lyla June Taylor, all of New Berlin, NY. Also survived by sister Wanda Doran and husband Bernie of Vicksburg, Mississippi as well as her three sons, Adam, Jason & Gary Paronish.

A Celebration and Thanksgiving for the Life and Service of The Very Reverend Charles G. Taylor was held at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in New Berlin, NY on April 22, 2016. The Right Reverend Gladstone B. "Skip" Adams, was Celebrant.

A private interment of ashes will be held at St. Andrew's Cemetery at the convenience of the family.

Diocesan Board—(Financial)

Submitted by Ms. Cathy Hobart, Controller

Accruals: Accruals for Lambeth which is held every ten years, Episcopal Youth Event and the Bishop's sabbatical and General Convention. It has been more than 10 years since the last Lambeth Conference was held. The Next Bishop Search funds previously accrued will be consumed in 2015 and 2016 as the Diocese transitions to a new Bishop with the retirement of Bishop Adams in 2016. The funds previously accrued for Sabbatical will be partially consumed in 2016 when Bishop Adams takes his sabbatical. Episcopal Youth Event occurs every three years. The last event was in 2014 and the next one will be in 2017. General Convention occurs every three years. The last General Convention was in 2015 in Utah. The next General Convention will be in 2018. A contingent of delegates (10 people) plus the Triennial representatives (3 or 4 people) and the Bishop attend.

Closed Parish properties: Costs of maintaining several closed parish properties – St. Thomas', North Syracuse; Christ Church, Wellsburg; Christ Church, Sackets Harbor; St. John's, Elmira Heights; All Saints', Utica. All properties have been or will be listed for sale. The properties are vacant at this time.

Pass Through Expenses: Pass through funds from Bishop's Visitations, annual solicitation for Contributor's Fund and payment from Church Insurance for Risk Management Program. Funds expended come from outside sources.

Block Grants: Three Block Grants were awarded in 2015: Grace, Syracuse \$3,000 – jail ministry discretionary funds; St. Matthew's, Liverpool \$3,000 – Sunday supper Program; Cornell Chapel, Ithaca \$4,135 – Thursday night choral Compline (funded from restricted funds). The budget was \$7,500.00.

MDG's: Six matching grants were made in 2015 for a total of \$8,110.00 to four parishes: St. James', Skaneateles; Grace, Utica; St. James', Clinton (2 grants); St. John's, Oneida and St. Thomas' Hamilton. The grants are awarded by the Global Mission Committee.

Episcopal Church Assessment: National Church Assessment based on 16.5% of the 2015 diocesan income from the annual diocesan report, net of an \$150,000 exclusion for having a bishop. The assessment funds the budget of The Episcopal Church, which was adopted by General Convention in July 2015. The Budget for January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018 is \$125,012,351. Funding policy for the period is adopted based on a single asking of the dioceses. After a \$150,000 exemption from total income, a single asking shall be applied as follows: 2016 – 18%, 2017 – 16.5% and 2018 – 15% of the balance of income to the Diocese, reported in the diocesan financial statements for the year two years prior to the year in which the pledge is applied.

Global Missions: During 2015, \$1,320 was spent to send one representative to the annual Global Missions Network Conference.

Parish Mission Commitments: Parish Mission Commitments is the payment of earnings from endowments restricted for those specified parishes. During 2015, payments were made quarterly to 35 parishes for a total of \$ 94,851. There is also a restricted fund that the proceeds are distributed between two parishes and a cemetery at the donor's request included in the above numbers. The funds are all held in UIF – Long Term Fund.

Retiree Benefits: Health insurance and life insurance costs for lay retirees from diocesan staff. Also, health insurance costs for retired clergy spouses under age 65. These costs are paid in full by the covered individual. Actuarial study of retiree benefits required for annual audit. Once a year lunch gathering for retired clergy. Cost for this lunch is fully covered by restricted endowment.

Seminarian Scholarships: COM Ordination for Ministry Team awards scholarships. In 2015, a scholarship totaling \$6,015 was given to one student at General Theological Seminary.

Bishop Search (Standing Committee): The process of searching for the 11th Bishop began in 2015. \$9,575 was spent for expenses of the Search Committee and work with a consultant. Funds previously budgeted for accruals for Next Bishop Search and Sabbatical in 2015 were used towards these costs.

Stewardship: In 2015 and 2016, diocesan access to the Annual Stewardship (TENS) webcast was \$150.00; and annual diocesan membership (allowing every parish access to TENS support) was \$1,000.00.

Thornfield Property: This property was sold in August 2015 for \$1,200,000. Net proceeds received from the sale after fees was \$1,122,628. During 2015, \$7,676 was spent in upkeep of the property, costs for moving the Memorial Garden and the sale.

Unincorporated Parish Properties: Property maintenance and insurance expenses related to several unincorporated properties including Paris Hill. Paris Hill expenses are covered by restricted endowment funds.

UTO: A grant to the national UTO was made from the balance of the restricted endowment earnings for the year of \$5,473.

Ministry Support: This budget included lay employee compensation and benefits. Also, the costs of maintaining and operating the diocesan offices, including rent, supplies, equipment, phone and internet, insurance, meeting expenses, postage, travel and training for staff, dues and fees, uncollectible assessments, depreciation, professional services, audit, legal, and audit scholarship.

In April 2015, the Director of Formation left the full-time position. She returned to part-time work in the same position from June 2015 through December. In October 2015, the Diocesan Board hired a part-time (13 hours/month) Youth Ministry Coordinator.

In August 2015, the Diocesan Board hired a part-time (20 hours/week) Communications Specialist to create and execute a comprehensive communications plan for the Diocese. The Communications Specialist oversees all diocesan communications, including social media, e-mail marketing, the diocesan website, print publications, and national and local press relations. In June 2016, the Diocesan Board temporarily increased the Communications Specialist's hours to 30/week so that she could support the Transition Committee and Standing Committee in all communications related to the election and on-boarding of the eleventh Bishop of Central New York.

Significant accomplishments include (through June 2016):

- Design and launch (expected Summer 2016) of redesigned, fully mobileresponsive diocesan website;
- Significant reach and engagement on social media and through e-mail Marketing;
- Customized consultation and support offered to ministries and parishes of the Diocese;
- Communications workshops offered to clergy and lay leaders at Diocesan Convention, P.E.A.C.E., and Epiphany Clericus.

Significant expenses generated in 2015 and 2016 include:

- Design and launch of new diocesan website;
- Small projects outsourced to vendors (graphic design, video editing);
- Professional development (Episcopal Communicators Conference & dues);
- Mileage reimbursement to Communications Specialist.

Standing Committee

The Standing Committee of the Diocese is authorized by the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church as well as by the Canons of the Diocese of Central New York. It is composed of four clerical members and four lay members, one of who in each order is elected by Diocesan Convention for a four year term. The Committee met November 14, 2015 immediately following Diocesan Convention and elected the Rev. Christine Day as President, Ms. Stacey Balduf as Secretary, and the Rev. Joell Szachara as Representative to the Board.

Much of the Committee time this year has been spent on the process of search and transition for the 11th Bishop of Central New York. The Standing Committee was the overseer of the search and transition process and served as the liaison with the Pastoral Development Officer and the Presiding Bishop's Office. It set the policies, time frame, budget (in conjunction with the Diocesan Board) and appointed the consultant, chaplain, Search Committee and Transition Committee. The Episcopal Transition absorbed much of the Standing Committee's time as it set the Special Rules for the Electing Convention, certified the election results, certified the consents from other Standing Committees for the Election of the 11th Bishop of Central New York, planned and chaired the regular Diocesan Convention and approved plans for the Consecration. Finally, the Standing Committee served as the Ecclesiastical Authority from November 1 through December 3, 2016.

The forms for these various transactions must be completed and submitted to the Standing Committee at least **two weeks** prior to a meeting of the Standing Committee, so that all members may have time to carefully review the materials before the meeting. Parish representatives may personally present their case to the Committee, but completely prepared and legible paperwork is required because the paperwork becomes part of the materials submitted to the NYS Supreme Court. NYS

Supreme Court and the Attorney General's Office require legible paperwork, typed or printed neatly in ink.

Bishop Skip led us using the themes of Holy Week to guide us in our meditations. We received and update from The Very Rev. Carrie Schofield-Broadbent on the Bishop's Search, and celebrated the Eucharist with Renewal of Ordination Vows and blessing of oils. The day concluded with lunch.

Commission on Ministry

The funds received by the Commission on Ministry in 2015 and 2016 were used primarily for professional fees associated with discernment and ordination processes, including psychological evaluations, background checks, and General Ordination Examinations. A modest amount covered the expenses of a gathering for Discernment Center Teams.

Companion Diocese Committee

This diocesan committee continues to learn about, live, work and pray with our sisters and brothers in El Salvador, and most especially among the members of Iglesia Episcopal Anglicana de El Salvador (IAES). Hundreds of the parishioners in IAES have met some of the pilgrims from Central New York. In addition to the Mission of Miracles, more than eighty-five persons have experienced life in the churches, in the countryside, and in the streets of El Salvador in the past eleven years – some several times. Likewise, Central New York has received returning missionaries and Salvadoran clergy in close to a dozen parishes and at our Convention. The message of changed lives is carried to our parishes by returning parish members, by sermons, and through Facebook and Twitter.

All are invited to be part of the ministry. We encourage all persons and parishes, most importantly, to pray the Prayer Cycle for the Companion Diocese, published on the Diocesan web site, on Facebook and in brochures available at convention. Those who are able are invited to join a pilgrimage or mission trip. The gospel is spread by serving the poor and marginalized, but more so by openly demonstrating the need and offering opportunities. All ages and abilities can participate, bless and be blessed.

<u>Annual Report – Diocesan Convention (2015)</u>

Our Diocesan Canons state, "there shall be an annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of CNY" Article I. The purpose of Convention is to elect members of the committees of the Diocese, approve the budget, receive reports from the Bishop, the Treasurer, special committees, and to hear and vote on resolutions. Convention is a 2-day meeting held in November. In addition to this meeting, the Secretary of Convention oversees the filing of the Parochial Reports for parishes of the Diocese, certifies Lay Delegates, calls for reports from the committees/commissions/ministries of the Diocese, plans for the Convention registrations, budget hearings, and speakers and events to happen at Convention.

The 2015 Convention theme was "To Everything A Season". The 147th Annual

Convention of the Diocese of Central New York was held on November 13 & 14 at the Holiday Inn in Liverpool. There were representatives from 75 parishes and included 150 lay representatives and delegates, 11 youth delegates, and 76 clergy, and 26 Alternate Delegates.

The required business of Convention included the certification of Lay Delegates, introduction of clergy new to the Diocese, election of members to the Diocesan Board, Standing Committee, Disciplinary Board members and other Committees of the Diocese. The budget was presented and voted on. Convention delegates considered thirteen resolutions - each was debated and voted on. Convention remembered parish leaders who have died since last Convention as well as the following clergy: the Rt. Rev. David C. Bowman, The Rt. Rev. O'Kelley Whitaker, The Rev. Marjory Chamberlin, The Rev. Robert Deacon, The Rev. Ralph Locke, and the Rev. W. Kilmer Sites. Bishop Adams gave his annual address and presided over the Convention Eucharist and the Rev. Dr. Renée Tembeckjian assisted in the preparation of the service. Mr. James Comet played the organ and Mr. Ron Hebert served as the choirmaster for a choir of volunteer singers from parishes throughout the Diocese. The Rt. Rev. Juan David Alvarado, Diocesan Bishop of El Salvador was with us during Convention. The Rev. Dr. Renée Tembeckjian, Director of Formation, reported on activities of the Compass Institute and also noted special anniversaries of parishes in the Diocese: St. Matthew's in Liverpool celebrated their 75th year anniversary. St. George's in Chadwicks celebrated their 125th Anniversary; St. Mark's in Port Leyden celebrated their 150th year anniversary; Grace Church, Elmira, celebrated their 150th year anniversary; and Christ Church in Jordan, celebrated their 175th year anniversary. The Eucharist offering of \$4165.33 was designated to Episcopal Relief and Development fund for the Syrian refugee relief. Ms. Ruthie Koerts and Ms. Terri Weir coordinated the Exhibit Hall with 20 different exhibitors.

In addition to the days of Convention, there is a lot of work, pre-planning and required Canonical reports to be filed. Parochial Reports for each parish were due on May 1st. Lay Delegate certificates, as required, were mailed out by the Secretary of Convention and returned by the May 30th deadline. There were a potential of 88 parishes/chapels/mission who were entitled to have representation at Convention. All parishes were current with payments to the Church Pension Fund payments. No parishes were in arrears of their mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission apportionment, thus all parishes were eligible to have representation. Nine parishes/chapels were unrepresented by choice. Thus, there were 79 parishes represented at Convention. Journals of the minutes of Convention were prepared and distributed to Lay Delegates and Clergy.

There were countless hours of work by a many people that made Convention a success. The Diocesan staff was involved in mailings of registration materials and working with committees that had responsibilities at Convention. Staff and volunteers worked to coordinate exhibits, recruit nominations for open offices, prepare the liturgy and music, plan for youth events, review and recommend changes to Constitution and Canons, resolutions, budgets and finance, make arrangements with hotel for meals

and lodging, copy material, enter registrations, and manual labor to transport equipment to the hotel for the meeting. In addition, there were many individuals who had responsibility for their part in the arrangements on the day of Convention and the required events that happened before the day of Convention.

Prior to Convention there were regional meetings (to discuss the proposed budget and the resolutions to be voted on) held at All Saints' in Johnson City, Grace Church in Syracuse and Trinity Church in Watertown.

Diocesan Youth Ministry

Diocesan funding for youth ministry is used to fund three youth retreat programs – Vocare, Happening, and New Beginnings. In 2016, there was no Vocare event held due to lack of interest. In 2015, the Happening Retreat program had to cancel one of its two events, due to inadequate enrollment. However, the spring 2016 Happening event had more than 35 participants. In 2015, New Beginnings began meeting in sponsoring parishes to help to defray the cost of events. In the Spring 2016 New Beginnings event, 31 participants and 12 team members were in attendance.

During this past year, diocesan funding was used for social events, including the youth picnic that was well attended (about 40 youth) and a winter skating event (23 youth attended). In 2015, formational activities included an online Advent study/discussion group that focused on mission and outreach. A small group of diocesan youth (weekly average of 3-4 youth in attendance) participated in this group. This pilot program was designed to bring diocesan youth together in an online meeting room to overcome barriers due to transportation, etc.

In addition, we set aside money each year to help fund EYE (Episcopal Youth Event). This is an international youth event that occurs once every three years.

COM Discernment for Ministry

It was determined by the COM early on that this position, mainly being a Communication role, is better served by one person. It therefore is the sole responsibility of this Chair to keep track of people making their initial inquiry as to what the Diocese of CNY expects of one seeking discernment to lay or ordained ministry. In their first conversation they share briefly their history and sense of call. Four suggestions are then given them: Read <u>Listening Hearts</u>, establish a relationship with a licensed Spiritual Director other than personal clergy, keep a journal regularly, and if possible, with Rector's guidance, establish a parish prayer group for guidance and support.

Narrative for the 2017 PROPOSED BUDGET for Mission and Ministry

The Proposed Budget presented to the 148th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Central New York is structured around the **Five Marks of Mission** of the Anglican Communion, as is the budget of The Episcopal Church. Those marks are:

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom;
- 2. To teach, baptize, and nurture new believers;
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service;
- 4. To seek to transform unjust structures of society;
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

We have used this structure for Diocesan budgets since 2013.

In addition to the Marks of Mission, the Proposed Budget funds the administration and governance of the Diocese. The Budget Committee of the Diocesan Board believes that structuring the budget in this way emphasizes diocesan programs for ministry and mission. The other two sections, administration and governance, support everything we do.

We have a new bishop. As the Board, we deliberated carefully how best to fund what we understood were needs of the Diocese, while retaining some flexibility to respond to the requests our bishop-elect would have for programs, staff changes, and other items as she begins her episcopate.

There are a number of major changes for 2017:

- ◆ In 2016, the Diocesan Board underwrote all the Youth Events from the earnings of the proceeds of the sale of Thornfield so that no fees had to be charged. As a result, the numbers of youth attending these events (including New Beginnings and Happening) increased noticeably. The Board has again chosen to utilize a small portion of the earnings from Thornfield proceeds so that we can make these programs 'free' to our youth in 2017. (Line 21)
- With great sadness, we accepted the resignation of the Rev. Lisa Busby as our Diocesan Youth Minister in August when she was called to a full-time rector position in the Diocese of Alabama. We have retained the ¼ time salary of \$15,500 for a potential Youth Minister in the 2017 budget, with these funds also coming from the earnings from the Thornfield sale proceeds. (Line 20)
- The Director of Formation position continues to be vacant. Monies will remain in the budget for formation programs. (Line 23)
- Bishop-Elect DeDe expects that she will be traveling more as she becomes familiar with the Diocese. So, she is asking that we purchase a car outright for her rather than provide a car on lease as was the case with Bishop Skip. (Line 25)
- Ms. Pam Stewart is the new Coordinator for Safeguarding God's Children

- (formerly known as Safe Church). She has requested more robust funding for this valuable program. (Line 46)
- The Episcopal Church assessment has been reduced for the second year in a row. This year, it was reduced to 16.5%, (a reduction of \$34,434) as seen on Line 50. As the notes on that line indicate, the decrease is part of a multi-year plan (approved by General Convention) to reduce the Assessment to 15% by 2018. Parishes will continue to share in this reduction with a credit equal to the pro-rated savings offered to our diocese. (Line 51).
- We have had the privilege of two bishops for a period of time in 2016, but will only have one going forward. This results in a decrease of \$12,373. (Line 56).
- ◆ As of August 31st, we have spent \$42,196 of our budget of \$178,302 for Bishop Search and transition. We will still have some substantial expenses for the remainder of the year. We will begin to accrue for this account again in the 2017 budget. (Line 64 and 61)
- At Bishop-Elect DeDe's request, the Diocesan Board has increased our Communication Specialist, Ms. Meredith Kadet Sanderson, to a full-time employee with the title of Director of Communications. This recognizes several realities: technology is becoming more prominent and critical in the promotion of our congregations to the larger world; we need increased support to parishes with communications issues; and we need to have someone working on diocesan communications, including public relations, in a comprehensive way. (Line 67)
- We have approved a 2.1% COLA for the diocesan staff who have done a remarkable job of keeping everything going during this transition year. This increase is consistent with increases from the last few years. The largest portion of the increase of staff is reflected in the salary for the Communications Specialist as stated above. (Line 67)
- Costs for lay retirees are increasing, as we expect one new staff retiree in 2017.
 (Line 90)
- We are putting funds aside to accommodate replacement of assets as needs arise. We were unable to do this in 2016. Doing so here builds up our reserves for stronger fiscal responsibility. (Line 93)

We have continued to utilize funds from endowment income as recommended by the Diocesan Investment Committee.

Expenses are apportioned this way: Program/Mission (29.5%); Governance (17.1%); Administration (45.2%); and Pass-through items (8.1%). The sources of income are Assessment and Pledge (67.9%); Investment Income (27.4%); Fees (2.8%); Grants (1.2%); Reserves/Savings (0.3%); Miscellaneous/Other (0.4%).





2015 Parish Quota, Pledge & Assessment

The diocesan budget is funded in large part by the assessments and pledges of the parishes. The quota, pledge and assessment of each parish for 2015 are listed in the following table in accordance with Canon XIV, Section 8. The information displayed is for 2015, as this Journal is a historical document that chronicles activities of the prior year.

Quota

The quota requested from each parish is calculated from a three-year moving average of parish normal operating income. For the 2015 budget, quotas were calculated using data provided by parishes on Parochial Reports for the years 2011-2013. (Parochial Reports are due in March of the year following that of the report, making the 2014 data unavailable until mid-2015). The amount requested of each parish was 6% and appears in the "Quota" column of the table. The "Pledge" column represents the commitment of each parish to that 6% quota. This is a voluntary contribution.

Assessment

The assessment of each parish is calculated from the same three-year moving average of normal operating income as is the quota, described above. For the 2015 budget, the assessment rate was set by the Diocesan Board at 10%. These figures appear in the column labeled "Assessment" in the table. The assessment is a mandatory contribution.

Unified Investment Fund

During 2011, the Board approved a change to the underlying legal structure of the investment funds and the creation of a new corporate entity called the Unified Investment Fund of the Diocese of Central New York. This change necessitated the termination of Central Investment Fund No. 2 and Central Investment Fund No. 3 at the end of 2011. Central Investment Fund No. 2 was closed on November 30, 2011. Central Investment Fund No. 3 was closed on December 31, 2011.

These changes were designed to enhance the administration and management of the Diocesan investment funds and allow for improved communication about the asset allocation and performance of our portfolios. The investments were consolidated with one investment manager and all funds will move from a quarterly to a monthly valuation.

Following a disciplined approach, the Investment Committee reviewed proposals from a wide range of money management firms and selected Alesco Advisors of Pittsford, New York to serve as the Diocese's new investment manager. Alesco is an independent, SEC–registered investment advisor with over \$1.4 billion under advisement. Alesco creates broadly diversified global portfolios utilizing low-cost asset class investments. These changes are in the best interest of the Diocese and participating Diocesan institutions and will create greater flexibility and transparency for the Parishes participating in our investment funds. The assets are domiciled (with oversight and supervision by the Diocesan Board) with Fidelity Investments.

UIF offers two investment options, the Long-Term Fund and the Intermediate-Term Fund. The main investment fund is the Long-Term Fund. The primary objective of the fund is to preserve the real purchasing power of the assets. The secondary objective is to provide for long-term growth. The third objective is to provide dependable source of funds to cover on-going operating expenses of The Diocese. The fourth objective is to minimize the year-to-year volatility of the Long-Term Fund's value. The Intermediate-Term Fund is an alternative to the Long-Term Fund that Diocesan Organizations may use where capital/campaign funds need to be held for use in less than five years. This fund will seek moderate to high level of current income with a primary goal of providing an opportunity for capital appreciation with low volatility and anticipating a capital withdrawal within 3-5 years. Diocesan Organizations will be encouraged to address immediate and short-term needs (less than three years) by establishing their own money market or like account outside of this program.

For the Long Term Fund, the target annual distribution rate shall not exceed 5% of the average market value of the fund for the preceding 20-quarters. For the Intermediate Term Fund, starting in 2014, the target annual distribution rate shall not exceed 2% of the average market value of the fund for the preceding 20-quarters. For 2015, the distribution rate was 4.0% from the Long Term Fund and 1.5% from the Intermediate Term Fund. For 2016, the distribution rate will remain at 4% from the Long Term Fund and 1.5% from the Intermediate Term Fund.

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Constitution

(Adopted in the Convention of the Diocese of Central New York, June 14, 1870; as amended in subsequent Conventions)

Article I.

Sec. 1. There shall be an annual Convention of the Church in the Diocese of Central New York, meeting on such day as the Ecclesiastical Authority may determine and select.

Sec. 2. For sufficient cause occurring after the designa-tion of the date or place of meeting the Ecclesiastical Authority may appoint another date or place or both for the meeting of the Convention.

Article II.

The Ecclesiastical Authority may call Special Conventions. The purpose or purposes for which a Special Convention is called shall be stated in the call for such Convention, and no business not germane to such purpose or purposes shall be in order except by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of those present and voting in each of the clerical and lay orders.

Article III.

- Sec. 1. The members of any Convention shall be:
 - (a) The Bishop;
 - (b) The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and also, if there be any, the Assisting Bishop Suffragan;
 - (c) All members of the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese not under discipline;
 - (d) All shared community pastors in charge of parishes in union with the Convention who shall be clerical members of the Convention;
 - (e) From each parish in union with the Convention that number of lay delegates to which it is entitled according to the following table, based on the Table of Parochial Statistics in the Journal of the preceding Convention:

300 or fewer communicants 2 delegates 301-500 communicants 3 delegates over 500 communicants 4 delegates

provided, however, that no parish shall be entitled to lay representation in any Convention if it is in arrears in payment of its assessment to the Church Pension Fund, or for the Diocesan Mission Apportionment for the calendar year prior to January the first preceding the Convention, unless, if it is in arrears in such payment for the Diocesan Mission Apportionment, the Convention shall remit such arrearage; and

- (f) All Commissioned Evangelists of the Church Army, resident and working in the Diocese for at least one year, who shall be lay members of the Convention.
- Sec. 2. Each member of Convention shall be entitled to one vote.
- Sec. 3. The lay delegates shall be chosen by the governing body of the parish. Persons meeting the qualifications set out in Canon II shall be eligible to serve as lay delegates to and to vote at any Convention and shall also be eligible for election or appointment to any lay office of the Diocese.
- Sec. 4. The definition of a parish, the mode of admitting parishes into union with Convention, and the conditions under which union or representation shall be forfeited, may be prescribed by Canon.

Article IV.

Every Convention shall be opened with prayers and there shall be a Celebration of the Holy Communion during the meeting of Convention at a time set by the Bishop.

Article V.

The Bishop or, if there be one, the Bishop Coadjutor or the Bishop Suffragan, shall preside in the Convention; but in case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, inability to act, or necessary absence, the President of the Standing Committee, or, in his or her absence, the senior in office among the clerical members of the Standing Committee present, shall preside in the Convention.

Article VI.

A Secretary shall be chosen upon the assembling of the Annual Convention, who shall remain in office until the meeting of the next Annual Convention or until a successor shall be appointed. The manner of nomination of the Secretary may be prescribed by Canon. The Secretary may be removed at any time from office by the Standing Committee for any neglect or misconduct, of which they shall be the judge. The duties of the Secretary shall be to take minutes of the proceedings of the Convention, to preserve the journals and records, to attest the public acts of the body, and faithfully to deliver into the hands of his or her successor all books and papers relative to the concerns of the Convention which may be in his or her possession. It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to give due notice to each member of the clergy and the governing body of each parish of the time and place appointed for the meeting of each Convention. The Secretary shall also perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Canons of General Convention and of the Diocese.

Article VII.

Sec. 1. In all matters which come before the Convention, the clergy and laity shall deliberate, and, except as otherwise provided in the next section, may vote in one body; but if in any case it shall be required by Canon or by ten members the two orders shall vote separately, the clergy as individuals, and the laity as individual delegates; and the concurrence of a majority of each order present and voting shall be necessary to constitute a decision.

Sec. 2. In case of the election of a Bishop, the two orders shall always vote separately by ballot, and the concurrence of a majority of those present and voting in each order shall be necessary to constitute an election.

Article VIII.

The mode of altering the Constitution shall be as follows: A proposition for an amendment shall be introduced in writing, and considered in the Convention, and if approved shall lie over till the next Annual Convention. If again approved in such next Convention by a majority of those present and voting in each order, the change shall take effect immediately unless otherwise expressly provided. The adoption of any alteration or amendment of this Constitution which inserts or repeals an Article, or a Section or Clause of an Article, shall effect the necessary change in numbers or letters of Articles or Sections or Clauses of an Article that follow, and in references made in this Constitution to any other part, without the necessity of specific provision therefore in the alteration or amendment.

Article IX.

No amendment of the Canons shall be made during the sessions of the Convention in which the same shall be proposed, unless by a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting in which event the

amendment shall take effect immediately unless otherwise expressly provided; but any amendment, if approved by a majority less than two-thirds, shall lie over for the consider-ation and final action of the next Annual Convention, and, if again approved by a majority vote, shall take effect immediately unless otherwise expressly provided. The adoption of any alteration or amendment of the Canons which inserts or repeals a Canon, or a Section or Clause of a Canon, shall effect the necessary change in numbers or letters of Canons or Sections or Clauses of a Canon that follow, and in references made in the Canons to any other part, without the necessity of specific provision therefore in the alteration or amendment.

Canons

Canon I.

Of the Clerical Members of Convention.

Sec. 1. At least one week before the meeting of every Conven-tion of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall cause to be prepared a list of all the members of the clergy canonically resident in this Diocese, annexing the names of their respective parishes, or places of residence, designating those who are entitled to seats in the Convention. No member of the clergy, while suspended from the ministry, shall have a place on the list. Such list shall be available to the Conven-tion on the first day of meeting and shall be prefixed to the Journal.

Sec. 2. At least one week before the meeting of every Convention of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall cause to be prepared a list of all shared commun-ity pastors in charge of parishes in union with the Convention, annexing the names of their respective parishes or places of residence, who shall be clerical members of the Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article III, Section 1, paragraph (d) of the Constitution. Such list shall be available to the Convention on the first day of meeting and shall be prefixed to the Journal.

Sec. 3. The right of any member of the clergy of this Diocese to a seat in the Convention if disputed shall be determined by a vote of the Convention itself in accordance with the provisions of Article III of the Constitution.

Sec. 4. The proof of the regular admission of a member of the clergy into this Diocese shall consist of evidence satisfactory to the Convention of a compliance with the Canons of the General Convention; and the proof of a settlement in a parish thereof shall consist of evidence satisfactory to the Convention of a like compliance.

Canon II.

Of the Lay Members and Organization of the Convention.

Sec. 1. The lay delegates and alternates from each parish shall be chosen by the Vestry from laypersons eighteen years of age or older belonging to the parish, who shall be confirmed communicants and who shall have been regular attendants at its worship and contributors to its support for at least twelve months prior to being chosen. The choice of lay delegates and their alternates shall be certified in writing by the rector, vicar or priest-in-charge of the parish which they represent, or by one of the wardens or the clerk of the governing body of the parish. Such certificate shall be forwarded to the Secretary not later than May 31st of each year and shall also state that each delegate and alternate so certified was eligible to be chosen, that the parish is not in arrears in payment of its assessment to the Church Pension Fund, and that the parish is not in arrears in payment of its assessment for the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment for the calendar year prior to the Convention (or if the parish is in arrears in such payment for the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment, that the parish prays that such arrearage be remitted by the Convention for the good and sufficient reasons presented in a

paper accompanying such certificate). The Secretary, upon receipt of such paper, shall transmit the same without delay to the Diocesan Board through its Secretary, which body shall review the case and make recommendation to the Convention thereon. The form of said certificate may be prescribed by the Convention; when so prescribed no other certificate of the appointment of any lay delegate or alternate to the Convention of this Diocese shall be allowed or received.

- Sec. 2. At least one week before the meeting of every Convention of this Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall cause to be prepared a list of all Commissioned Evangelists of the Church Army resident and working in the Diocese for at least one year, annexing their place of residence, who shall be lay members of the Convention pursuant to the provisions of Article III Section 1, paragraph (f) of the Constitution. Such list shall be available to the Convention on the first day of meeting and shall be prefixed to the Journal.
- Sec. 3. At every Convention the Bishop, as Presiding Officer, shall take the chair and shall continue to preside during its sitting, shall possess the usual powers of presiding officers in deliberative assemblies and, subject to an appeal to the Convention, shall decide all questions of order without debate. The Bishop shall have the right to call the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, to the chair, or there being no Bishop Coadjutor, the Bishop Suffragan, or there being no Bishop Suffragan, to name the President of the Standing Committee, or, in his or her absence, the senior in office among the clerical members of the Standing Committee present, as Presiding Officer; but such substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment unless agreed to by the Convention.
- Sec. 4. In case of the absence or disability of the Bishop or of a vacancy in the office, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, or the Bishop Suffragan, if there be one, and there be no Bishop Coadjutor, or the Bishop Coadjutor be absent or disabled, or if there be no bishop present and able to act, the President of the Standing Committee, or, in his or her absence, the senior in office among the clerical members of the Standing Committee present shall call the Convention to order and act as Presiding Officer.
- Sec. 5. The presence of at least twenty clerical members of the Convention and of delegates from at least twenty parishes shall be necessary to the transaction of business, except that a smaller number may adjourn from day to day.
- Sec. 6. A quorum being found in attendance, the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention duly organized. The Secretary shall then be elected, who then may nominate one or more assistant secretaries to be approved by the Convention. In the absence of the Secretary, the assistant secretaries shall be nominated from the floor of the Convention. The assistant secretaries shall serve during the sessions of the Convention.
- Sec. 7. The Rules of Order of the preceding Annual Convention shall be the Rules of Order until altered by a vote of a majority of the Convention.
- Sec. 8. Laypersons, other than delegates, who are members of the Diocesan Board, or members of the Committees of the Board, or trustees of Diocesan corporations, members of the Standing Committee or of standing committees of Convention, Pastoral Leaders licensed by the Diocese, or other officers of the Diocese, shall have the privilege of the floor.
- Sec. 9. Prior to every Convention the Bishop may appoint a Committee on Agenda and Arrangements to make appropriate provision for both agenda and program as well as for facilities for such Convention. To the extent practicable, all groups and persons desiring inclusion of agenda items shall submit requests therefore to such Committee at least ten weeks prior to such Convention, together with an identification of the subject matter, whether inclusion is sought for action or information only, the form of the presentation proposed, and the time allocation desired. To the same extent, all groups and persons desiring space, services, or other facilities in connection with such Convention shall submit requests therefore with appropriate details to such Committee at least ten weeks prior to such Convention.

Canon III.

Of the Call of a Convention and Notices pertaining thereto.

Sec. 1. Notice of the meeting of any Convention shall be given by the Secretary in a letter, transmitted by mail, and or electronic communication, at the expense of the Convention, to every member of the clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, to every shared community pastor in charge of a parish in union with the Convention, to every priest-in-charge, to every Commissioned Evangelist of the Church Army resident and working in the Diocese for at least one year, to the lay authorities in every vacant parish, and to all delegates whose election has been certified to the Secretary, at least six weeks before the meeting. Extracts from the Constitution and Canons relating to the appointment of lay delegates, and a form of certificate of their election shall be sent by the Secretary to every parish by the end of the last full week of April of the year in which Convention is held.

- Sec. 2. Whenever, under the provision of the Constitution, a special Convention is called it shall be the duty of the Secretary, in the notice thereof, to specify the purpose or purposes for which it is called.
- Sec. 3. The Secretary shall, not less than six months before the meeting of each Annual Convention, notify all trustees or individuals having charge of any funds belonging to the Diocese of the responsi-bility imposed upon them by Canon XXV, Section 1. The Secretary shall also notify the chair of each special committee appointed by the preceding Convention to report to the next Convention, of the requirements of Canon XXV, Section 2.

Sec. 4. All proposed amendments to the Constitution, or Canons, should be submitted to the Committee on Constitution and Canons at least six weeks before the meeting of Convention; and, after consideration by the committee, a copy of the amendments so submitted shall be sent to all members of the Convention at least two weeks before the meeting at which they are to be considered.

Canon IV.

Of Attending the Meetings of the Convention.

- Sec. 1. The regular attendance of the clergy and laity at the meetings of the Convention being of essential consequence to the interest of the Church, this duty is hereby enjoined upon them.
- Sec. 2. No member of the clergy of the Diocese actively engaged in work in the Diocese shall, except for good and reasonable excuse, absent himself or herself from meetings of the Convention. In the event of such absence he or she shall make known to the Ecclesiastical Authority the reasons therefore.
- Sec. 3. No member of the Convention shall leave during its session without having applied for and received leave of absence from the Presiding Officer.

Canon V.

Of Parishes and Diocesan Chapels.

Sec. 1. **Parishes.** (a) One or more groups of Episcopalians, whether or not incorporated, (joined in appropriate instances with other Christians) shall be a parish when so certified and admitted into union by a majority vote of the members of the Convention present and voting. The application for such certification and admission shall be filed with the District Dean where the applicant is located. The application, with a report of the action taken thereon by the Dean, shall be forwarded to the Bishop within ninety days after the filing thereof. Thereafter, within one hundred twenty days of receipt, it shall be forwarded with advice of the action of the Bishop thereon to the next Convention of the Diocese for final action by such Convention. The distinctions between parishes and missions shall be eliminated except to the extent required by the Canons of General Convention and the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York.

- (b) A parish in union with Convention shall continue to be in union unless it is determined by Convention that the parish has failed to conduct regular worship services, or has failed to maintain an organized Vestry which meets regularly, or has failed for three consecutive years to meet its pledge for General & Diocesan Work of the Church as accepted by the Vestry, or is failing to make a good faith attempt to compensate its clergy at or above the guidelines adopted by Convention. A recommendation may be submitted to Convention by the Bishop, together with the Standing Committee, that a determination be made that a parish is no longer in union with Convention; furthermore, the Convention vote to terminate requires a two-thirds majority.
- (c) The Bishop may suggest a parish self-study at any time for the purpose of developing programs to assist the parish.
- (d) No certificate of consent to the incorporation of a parish shall be given by the Bishop or by the majority of the Standing Committee unless the applicant for such consent shall then be a certified parish admitted into union with the Convention as provided in Section 1 or 2 of this Canon.
- (e) Whenever hereafter any parish shall neglect to make the annual parochial report, and to forward the same to the Secretary of the Convention as required by Canon XXII.5, the Committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates shall so report to the Convention, and such parish shall be denied representation in the Convention of that year; except that, because of unusual circumstances explained to the Convention, such parish may be admitted to representation by a majority vote of the members of the Convention present and voting.
- (f) Each parish desiring financial aid from the Diocese shall make application therefore to the Diocesan Board.
- (g) No parish shall establish a new place of worship without the consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee after consultation with the Dean and the District Council, if there be one.
- (h) No parish shall encumber or alienate any real property, or any interest therein, other than by lease for not more than five years, without the consent of the Bishop and the Standing Committee and leave of Court as required by Sec. 12 of the New York State Religious Corporations Law.
- (i) The qualified voters at any election or special meeting of a parish shall be those persons of full age belonging to the parish, who have been baptized and are regular attendants at worship and contributors to its support for at least twelve months prior to such election or special meeting, or since the establishment of the parish. In any parish which has so determined in the manner provided in section forty-six of the Religious Corporations Law, persons of less than full age, but of the age of eighteen years or more and having the other qualifications of this section, shall also be qualified voters and eligible to be elected members of the vestry and, if confirmed communicants or received in the Episcopal Church, wardens.

(j) Parish Meetings.

- (I) Annual Election and Meeting. The annual election and meeting of each parish shall be held on the day, either a Sunday or a secular day, fixed by the vestry.
- (II) Special Meetings. Special meetings may be held on any Sunday or secular day fixed by the vestry.
- (III) Notice. Notice of each annual election and meeting and of any special meeting shall be read by the priest-in-charge, or if there be none or he or she be absent, by the officiating minister or by a warden, on each of the two Sundays next preceding such annual election and meeting or special meeting, in the time of divine service, or, if for any reason, the usual place of worship shall not be open for divine service, the notice shall be posted conspicuously on the outer door of the place of worship for two weeks next preceding the annual election and meeting or special meeting. Such notice shall specify the place, day and hour of holding the annual election and meeting or special meeting. The notice of each annual election and meeting shall also specify the number and terms of office of each warden and the vestry persons whose terms of office shall then expire, or whose office shall then be vacant for any cause, and

the office for which each such officer is to be then elected. The notice of any special meeting shall specify the matter or question to be brought before such meeting and no matter or question not specified in such notice shall be acted on at such meeting.

- (IV) Presiding Officer. The presiding officer of each annual election and meeting or special meeting shall be the priest-in-charge of the parish, if there be one, or if there be none or he or she be absent, one of the wardens elected by a majority of the qualified voters present, or if no warden be present, a vestry person elected in like manner. Such presiding officer shall be the judge of the qualifications of voters, shall receive the votes cast, and shall declare the result of the votes cast.
- (V) Action. The action of an annual election and meeting or special meeting on any matter or question shall be decided by a majority of the qualified voters present and voting thereon. The polls of an election shall continue open for one hour and longer, in the discretion of the presiding officer, or if required by a majority of the qualified voters present and voting. The wardens and vestry persons shall be elected by ballot from qualified voters at the meeting, and no person shall be eligible for election as a warden unless he or she is also a confirmed communicant in the Episcopal Church, or be eligible for election as a vestry person unless he or she shall have been baptized.

(k) Vestry.

- (I) The vestry shall consist of three, six or nine vestry persons as shall be determined by the parish at any annual or special meeting and of two wardens. At each annual election after the initial election of the vestry, one warden shall be elected to hold office for two years, and one-third of the total number of vestry persons of the parish shall be elected to hold office for three years. Each warden and vestry person shall hold office after the expiration of his or her term until his or her successor shall be chosen.
- (II) The vestry of an unincorporated parish shall have the powers, discretion, and responsibilities corresponding to the extent applicable, to those of the vestry of an incorporated parish, and shall likewise be subject to corresponding limitations.
- (I) Other Form of Organization. Notwithstanding any other provision hereof, any unincorporated parish may propose such other or different provision for its own organizational structure and operation as it shall deem appropriate. Any such proposal shall be submitted to the District Dean, the Bishop and the Convention in the same manner as an application for certification as a parish in union with the Convention under the provisions of Section 1 of this canon, and the organizational structure and operation of such parish shall conform to the action of the Convention.
- (m) When any real estate is acquired or to be acquired for an unincorporated parish, "The Diocese of Central New York" shall have the power to take and hold bare legal title thereto for the benefit of such parish subject to its direction and control as to the acquisition, use and disposition of such property. All expenses incident to the acquisition, management, maintenance and disposition of such property shall be borne by such parish. In the event that an unincorporated parish on re-examination pursuant to the provisions of Section 1 Paragraph (b) of this Canon is not recertified, "The Diocese of Central New York" shall have the power to make such disposition of any real property, title to which shall have been held by it for the benefit of such former parish (and of the proceeds of any disposition of such property) as to it shall seem appropriate, subject to the directions of the Convention contained in its determination not to recertify such former parish.

Sec. 2 Diocesan Chapels.

a) Any group of Episcopalians, whether theretofore comprising an incorporated parish, an unincorporated parish, other ministry or mission association or college chaplaincy or ministry, shall upon their request and certification by the Bishop and designation as such by the Convention of the Diocese become either a Diocesan Chapel or a Diocesan College Chapel or a Diocesan Mission Chapel.

- b) Each Diocesan Chapel shall be under the supervision of the Bishop and, subject to the approval of the Bishop, may adopt such procedures for the conduct of its affairs as it may desire. It shall not be a parish in union with the Convention or subject to the provisions of the Canons or other prescriptions with respect to parishes. Each Diocesan Chapel shall have the right, by whatever procedural means it may choose, to designate one lay representative to the Convention of the Diocese, which representative, although not a member of the Convention, shall have the privilege of the floor. Each Diocesan Chapel shall submit an Annual Parochial Report, or at the direction of the Bishop, prepare a Report of such form and content as the Bishop may prescribe.
- c) A Diocesan College Chapel may be established on the campus of a University or College situated within the Diocese for the expressed purpose of ministry and chaplaincy to the students, faculty and staff of that University or College. A majority of its Vestry or other Representative Body must be composed of persons who are adult members of the Episcopal Church as defined in the Canons of the General Convention and if a majority of its Vestry, or other Representative Body, is composed of adult members of the Episcopal Church as described above, at least one of whom serves as one of the Wardens, Chair or other leader of the Representative Body, the Diocesan College Chapel shall have the following privileges:
- 1) Each Diocesan College Chapel shall have the right, by whatever procedure it may choose, to designate one adult student Lay Representative to the Convention of the Diocese, which representative shall be a full member of Convention and shall have full privileges of the floor and vote.
- 2) Each Diocesan College Chapel shall qualify under Canons of the General Convention as a congregation for the purpose of sponsoring members of the congregation for Holy Orders.
- d) A Diocesan Mission Chapel, such as Ephphatha Mission for the Deaf, shall be under the supervision of the Bishop and, subject to the approval of the Bishop, may adopt such procedures for the conduct of its affairs as it may desire. Each Diocesan Chapel shall submit an Annual Parochial Report, or at the direction of the Bishop, prepare a Report of such form and content as the Bishop may prescribe.
- 1) Each Diocesan Mission Chapel shall have the right, by whatever procedure it may choose, to designate one adult Lay Representative to the Convention of the Diocese, which representative shall be a full member of Convention and shall have full privileges of the floor and vote.
- 2) Each Diocesan Mission Chapel shall qualify under Canons of the General Convention as a congregation for the purpose of sponsoring members of the congregation for Holy Orders.

Canon VI.

Of Diocesan Clusters.

- Sec. 1. Three or more parishes which are geographically related may apply for recognition as a Diocesan Cluster.
- Sec. 2. Such application shall set forth the terms of the proposed Cluster organization, including provisions for governance, for engage-ment of clergy, for contemplated activi-ties, for financial support, for operating procedures and for such other matters as may be appropriate; and shall be accompanied by agreements of the several parishes involved to participate in the Cluster, signed by the rector or priest in charge or, if there be none, the District Dean, and the vestry of each parish.
- Sec. 3. The application for recognition as a Diocesan Cluster shall be submitted to the Bishop. On approval by the Bishop of the application as originally submitted or as subsequently amended, the Diocesan Cluster shall be entitled to recognition as such.
- Sec. 4. After Cluster recognition, proposed amendments to the terms of Cluster organization shall be submitted to the Bishop for approval.

Canon VII.

Of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

In the event of the death, resignation, disability or prolonged absence of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop Coadjutor shall become the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese; if there be no Bishop Coadjutor, the Bishop Suffragan, if there be one, shall become temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Standing Committee of the Diocese shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all purposes declared by the General Convention only in the event of the absence or disability of all the Bishops herein named or of a vacancy in the Episcopate.

Canon VIII.

Of the Bishop and the Cathedral.

The Bishop, with the approval of the Diocesan Convention or, if it not be in session, of the Standing Committee, may from time to time and until a permanent Diocesan Cathedral shall be established, and with the consent of the Rector and Vestry of the parish concerned, select a parish church which shall be known as the Cathedral Church of (here insert the name of the parish). The Bishop, with the approval of the Standing Committee, may thereupon enter into such stipulations, in writing, with the Rector and Vestry of such parish concerning the rights of the Bishop in the use of the church building in Dioce-san affairs, as may be agreed upon, which stipulations shall be known as "The Institutes of the Cathedral".

Canon IX.

Of the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

Sec. 1. The Standing Committee of the Diocese, provided for by the General Convention in Article IV of the Constitution of the General Conven-tion, shall consist of four members of the clergy (presbyters or deacons) of this Diocese, and four laypersons, confirmed communicants of full age of the Church in this Diocese, one such member of the clergy and one such layperson to be elected annually by the Convention of the Diocese, each for a term of four years. The election shall be by ballot, and by the concurrent vote of a majority of those present and voting in each order. Vacancies in the Standing Committee occurring by death or otherwise may be filled until the next meeting of Conven-tion by the concurrent vote of the clerical and lay members of the Committee. Any member of the Committee having served two consecutive full terms shall not be eligible for immediate re-election.

Sec. 2. In case the Bishop of the Diocese be incapable of acting or in case there is no Bishop, and there is no Bishop Coadjutor or Bishop Suffragan capable of acting, the powers to be exercised and duties to be performed by the Bishop in matters of discipline shall be exercised and per-formed by the Standing Committee, except in those cases where such powers and duties are or may devolve and be enjoined upon the clerical members of the Committee in which case such powers shall be exercised and duties performed by the clerical members only provided that no sentence shall be pronounced upon a member of the clergy save by a Bishop.

- Sec. 3. The Secretary of the Standing Committee shall keep a true record of its proceedings and shall preserve all books, journals and papers belonging to the committee and transmit the same to his or her successor in office. The President of the Standing Committee shall report the proceedings annually to the Diocesan Convention.
- Sec. 4. In addition to action taken at a meeting duly convened, the Standing Committee is empowered and authorized to take action as follows:
- (a) By mail, telegraphic or electronic communication ballot. Notice shall be given to each member of the Standing Committee by mail, telegram or electronic communication describing the action proposed to be taken and setting forth the time (which shall be reasonable) within which and the name and address of the person or persons to whom ballots or other communications with reference thereto shall be sent. Members of the Committee may return ballots by mail, telegram or electronic communication and the results thereof shall be binding and any action

so approved shall be the action of the Committee, provided that

- (i) The ballots of at least two-thirds of all the mem-bers of the Committee favor the proposed action; and,
- (ii) Prior to the time set forth in the notice no member of the Committee shall have advised any person designated in the notice of his or her objection in the particular instance to action by mail, telegraphic or electronic communication ballot.
- (b) By conference telephone. By means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment allowing all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other at the same time. Participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at the meeting.

Canon X.

Of the Secretary of Convention.

Sec. 1. The Secretary of Convention shall be nominated to the Convention by the Standing Committee with the approval of the Bishop. In case the Convention declines to elect the nominee, the Bishop shall appoint a member of the Convention as secretary of the Convention pro tem, and the Standing Committee shall make, during the same Convention, a new nomination.

Sec. 2. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the Office of Secretary of Convention, the Bishop or other Ecclesiastical Authority, may, in consultation with the Standing Committee or the President thereof, appoint a Secretary pro tem, who shall serve until the next Annual Convention.

Sec. 3. The Secretary of Convention in addition to discharging the duties imposed by the Constitution and other provisions of these Canons, shall, subject to the orders of the Convention, issue the *Journal* of the Annual Convention and accompanying documents, and when published shall post the *Journal* on the website of the Diocese, and shall provide notice that the *Journal* is posted on the website to each member of the clergy of the Diocese, each lay delegate attending the Convention, and each parish in the Diocese. The Secretary shall maintain a printed copy of the *Journal* in the Diocesan Office and shall provide printed copies to clergy members, lay delegates, and parishes upon request. The Secretary shall provide one printed copy of the *Journal* to each member of the Diocesan Board, one copy to each member of the Standing Committee, two copies to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of General Convention and one copy to the Archives of the Church.

Sec. 4. As required by the Canons of the General Convention, the Secretary shall prepare a certified copy of the testimonials of the deputies elected to the General Convention and forward the same to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, together with a copy of the latest Journal of the Diocesan Convention. The Secretary shall also transmit to the Secretary of the House of Deputies the other documents required by the Canons of the General Convention.

Sec. 5. The Secretary shall maintain the Canonical Register of all clergy canonically resident in the Diocese which shall include the records required by the Canons of the General Convention.

Canon XI

Of the Treasurer.

The Diocesan Convention shall from time to time elect as Treasurer of the Diocese a person skilled in financial matters, including budgeting, accounting, banking, investment, and financial planning, on nomination of the Bishop with the approval of the Diocesan Board. The Treasurer shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop and the Board. A vacancy in the office of Treasurer shall be filled by similar election, provided that a vacancy occurring between meetings of the Convention may be filled until the next meeting of the Convention by appointment of the Bishop with the approval of the Board.

Canon XII.

Of the Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Bishop may nominate for the approval of the Convention a person or persons skilled in ecclesiastical and civil law to be the Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor of the Diocese, who shall act as legal advisers and counselors to the Bishop, the Standing Committee, ecclesiastical courts and the Convention, when called upon to do so, and advisor to the Diocesan Board and its Committees. It shall also be their duty to review any proposed amendments to the laws of the State which affect the Religious Corporations Law or the property interests of the Church and to cooperate with the representatives of the other Dioceses of the State in securing the passage or defeat of such proposed amendments, after reference to the Convention whenever appropriate.

Canon XIII.

Of Deputies to the General Convention and to the Provincial Synod and of Delegates to the Triennial Meeting of the Women of the Church

Sec. 1. The Convention shall, at either one of its two regular annual meetings held not later than twelve months preceding the opening date of the General Convention as shall be determined by the Bishop with the consent of the Standing Committee, elect by the concurrent ballot of the clerical and lay members present and voting, four members of the clergy and four laypersons, who shall be confirmed communicants of full age and residents of the Diocese, to act as Deputies from this Diocese to the General Convention. When the election of Clerical and Lay Deputies shall have been completed, the four members of the clergy and the four laypersons next in order in the balloting shall be declared duly chosen Alternate Deputies. The Deputies and Alternate Deputies shall hold office during the term of three years and until Deputies and Alternate Deputies shall next be elected.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Deputies-elect to signify in writing to the Bishop, not more than four weeks and not less than three weeks before the meeting of the General Convention, the acceptance of the appointment and their intention to perform its duties.

Sec. 3. All vacancies occurring by reason of default in acceptance of appointments under this Canon, or from any other cause, shall be filled by designation of the Bishop from the list of members of the clergy and laypersons elected as Alternate Deputies, in the sequence in which they were elected, and such persons when certified by the Bishop, shall have all the power and authority of Deputies duly elected by the Convention.

Sec. 4. Prior to each meeting of the Provincial Synod, the Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, may appoint not more than four members of the Clergy and not more than four laypersons Deputies to the Provincial Synod and name one of such Deputies the chair of the deputation. The Deputies and the chair so appointed shall hold office until a new deputation and chair shall be appointed. Any vacancy in the deputation shall be filled by similar appointment. Deputies so appointed shall be members of the Synod of the Second Province from the Diocese of Central New York and as such shall represent the Diocese in the House of Deputies of the Synod. The names of the persons so appointed shall be announced to the Diocese.

Sec. 5. In case of the inability of the Bishop to act or of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the power conferred upon the Bishop by this Canon shall be exercised by the President of the Standing Committee.

Sec. 6. At the regular Annual Meeting at which it elects Deputies to the General Convention, the Convention shall also elect by the concurrent ballot of the clerical and lay members present and voting, three persons who shall be confirmed adult communicants or members of the clergy of the Church and residents of the Diocese, to act, together with the Diocesan Custodian of the United Thank Offering as Delegates from this Diocese to the Triennial Meeting of the Women of the Church. When the election of these Delegates shall have been completed, the two laypersons or members of the clergy next in order in the balloting shall be declared duly chosen Alternate Delegates. Sections 2 and 3 of this Canon shall apply to the Delegates elected under this section in purpose and intent. The elected

Delegates and Alternate Delegates shall hold office during the term of three years and until Delegates and Alternate Delegates shall next be elected. The Diocesan Custodian of the United Thank Offering shall hold office as a Delegate until a successor Diocesan Custodian is designated.

Sec. 7. The necessary expenses of the Deputies attending the General Convention and the Provincial Synod and of the Delegates attending the Triennial of the Episcopal Churchwomen and their meetings held in conjunction with the Provincial Synod shall be paid by the Diocese in such amount as the Diocesan Board shall determine upon due presentation of proper vouchers signed by the Secretary of the same.

Canon XIV.

Of the Diocesan Board.

Sec. 1. The Diocesan Board shall be the policy making organization of the Diocese, subject to the authority of the Diocesan Convention. It shall articulate the mission of the Diocese, formulate strategies to carry out that mission, and be responsible for all programmatic activities of the Diocese. It shall be responsible for preparation and submission to the Diocesan Convention of the budget in accordance with Canon XVIII and for the administration of such budget and the collection of the income therefore and the expenditures of Diocesan funds in accordance therewith. It shall direct the operating structures of the Diocese, except as to matters within the jurisdiction of the Standing Committee, and shall coordinate the units of the Diocese.

- Sec. 2. (a) The Board shall be composed of the following members:
 - (i) The Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor if there be one;
 - (ii) A member of the Standing Committee elected by that Committee.
 - (iii) The Treasurer of the Diocese; and
 - (iv) Four persons, adult members of the Episcopal Church and residents of the Diocese, elected by the Diocesan Convention, each to serve for a three year term beginning at the close of the Convention at which elected and until his or her successor is elected, as follows:
 - -- in years divisible by three, one member of the clergy and one member of the laity;
 - --in the following year, one member of the laity; and
 - --in the second following year, one member of the clergy.
 - (v) Three persons, adult members of the Episcopal Church and residents of the Diocese of either the clerical or lay order, one elected by the Convention on nomination of the Bishop each year, to serve a term of three years beginning at the close of the Convention at which elected and until his or her successor is elected.
 - (vi) Provided, however, that no member elected by the Convention under paragraph (iv) may serve for more than two successive full terms.
- (b) Vacancies in the membership of the Board elected under paragraph (iv) of subsection (a) shall be filled for the unexpired term by election of the Diocesan Convention (on nomination of the Bishop if the previous occupant of the office was so nominated), provided that a vacancy occurring between meetings of the Convention may be filled until the next meeting of the Convention by the remaining members of the Board.
- Sec. 3. The members of the Board shall be the Trustees of "The Diocese of Central New York".
- Sec. 4. The Bishop shall be the President and presiding officer of the Board. The Board shall choose, from time to time, one of its members to be Vice President and another person, who need not be a member of the Board, to be its Secretary, each to serve at the pleasure of the Board.

- Sec. 5. The Board shall meet at stated intervals but at least four times a year, and at such other times as the Bishop or the Board may determine.
- Sec. 6. The Board shall organize itself into such Committees of the Board, and other committees and other subgroups as it may determine appropriate for the discharge of its responsibilities, including Committees on Finance, Ministry Support, Investment, and Property. The Finance Committee shall be the Diocesan body contemplated by the Canons of the General Convention. Additional Board committees shall include the Parish Visitation and Mission Review Committee, and may include the Long Range Planning Committee. Other committees shall be established as determined by the Board. The charge, scope and operating methods of all such Committees and other committees shall be set by the Board.
- Sec. 7. The Board shall adopt Bylaws for its governance and the conduct of its affairs.
- Sec. 8. The Board shall present to each Diocesan Convention, a report of its activities, including a written report by appropriate category of all moneys and other property received and all moneys expended. The Board shall also cause to be prepared for publication in each *Journal* of the Convention a table by Districts of all parishes in the Diocese, showing the Diocesan Mission Apportionment (including the mandatory portion) and the pledge of each parish. Information concerning the amount of aid given to parishes shall be available from the Diocesan financial office.

Canon XV.

Of the Commission on Ministry.

- Sec. 1. At each Annual Convention of the Diocese, subject to confirmation by the vote of the Convention, the Bishop shall nominate a Commission on Ministry to consist of not less than six nor more than twenty persons, one half of whom shall be of the lay order and one half of whom shall be of the clerical order, who shall hold office until their successors are nominated and confirmed.
- Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of this Commission on Ministry to assist the Bishop in all matters pertaining to lay and ordained Ministry in accordance with the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention of this Church.

Canon XVI.

Of Elections.

- Sec. 1. All elections required by the Constitution and Canons to be determined by ballot, except the election of a Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor, or Bishop Suffragan, shall be held according to the system of preferential voting known as the Single Transferable Vote. The regulations governing the use and counting of the ballots shall be those issued by the Diocese of Long Island, as revised in 1939, a copy of which has been deposited with the Secretary. Revisions of these regulations which do not affect the principles of the Single Transferable Vote, may be made by resolution of the Convention on the recom-mendation of the tellers, and filed with the Secretary.
- Sec. 2. A concurrent quota of both clerical and lay votes shall be necessary for election, with a majority of both orders present and voting.
- Sec. 3. (a) With the notice of the meeting of the Convention, the Secretary shall send to all clergy entitled to vote, to all shared community pastors in charge of parishes in union with the convention, to all Commissioned Evangelists of the Church Army entitled to be lay members of the Convention and to all delegates entitled to seats in the Convention a nomination blank, which shall contain the names of all offices to be filled at such Convention under the Canons of the Diocese, and under the Institutes of the Cathedral adopted pursuant to the provisions of these Canons, together with the names of the office holders whose terms of office expire.
 - (b) Clergy, shared community pastors, Commissioned Evangelists of the Church Army, or Lay Delegates,

or a duly certified alternate who has been designated to attend the Convention in place of any Lay Delegate, entitled to a seat in the forthcoming Convention, may file, prior to the assembling of the Convention, nominations for the offices to be filled at the Convention provided:

- (i) Such nominations shall be made on the nomination blank furnished by the Secretary and shall be signed by a member of the clergy, a shared community pastor, a Commissioned Evangelist of the Church Army entitled to a seat in the Convention, or a Lay Delegate.
- (ii) With such nominations shall be forwarded the written consent of the nominee to serve if elected, a biographical sketch of the nominee in not more than one hundred twenty words (to include residence, parish, Ecclesiastical status, profession or occupation, and a brief description of participation in relevant activities of the community, Diocese and national Church), and, if possible a photograph of the nominee.
- (iii) Such nominations and accompanying data shall be filed with the Secretary at least four weeks before the opening of the Convention.
- (iv) Such nominations shall not be accepted unless the certificate of election of delegates to the Convention which includes the name or names of those making the nominations has been first filed with the Secretary and also complies with the Canons of the Diocese.
- (c) The Secretary of the Convention shall prepare and forward to all members of the clergy, shared community pastors, Commissioned Evangelists of the Church Army entitled to be members of Convention, and Lay Delegates, so that it shall be received at least four days before the opening of Convention, a brochure containing a statement of all offices to be filled at the Convention, and the names, biographical sketches and photographs of the persons nominated in accordance with this Canon for each office, arranged in alphabetical order.
- (d) All nominations made in accordance with this Canon shall be reported by the Secretary to the Convention on the first day according to the Rules of Order. The form of ballot shall include the names of the nominees for each office nominated in accordance with this canon and arranged by lot, together with the names of persons nominated from the floor of Convention, arranged thereafter in the order of such nomination.
- Sec. 4. In all cases of failure or omission to elect officers by the Convention, the persons last elected shall continue in office until others be chosen.
- Sec. 5. In case of vacancies in office, the filling of which is not otherwise provided for in the Canons, occurring during recess, it shall be competent for the Standing Committee, with the approval of the Bishop, to fill, ad interim, any position which the Convention, if in session, might fill.

Canon XVII.

Of Districts of the Diocese.

- Sec. 1. The Diocese shall be divided into Districts, the number and boundaries of which may be changed from time to time by the Bishop, after consultation with the Districts involved, and with the advice and consent of the Diocesan Board. Consultation with the Districts shall be with the District Council, if there be one, and with the Dean.
- Sec. 2. It shall be the responsibility of each District, in concert with the Diocesan Board, to undertake and coordinate regional ministries that fall predominantly within the District. The Dean shall report thereon as required by the Diocesan Board.
- Sec. 3. Each District shall meet in Convocation at least once in each year, prior to Diocesan Convention. The members of each Convo-cation shall include the members of the clergy and shared community pastors resident in the District and such number of lay delegates representing each parish within the District as the District shall determine. Such lay delegates shall be chosen in the manner determined by the governing body of the parish.

- Sec. 4. The principal officer of each District shall be the Dean, who shall be appointed by the Bishop, from the members of the clergy of the District. The Dean shall take office immediately upon appointment, and shall serve at the pleasure of the Bishop. The Dean shall have such responsibilities as may be required by the Bishop, the Board, or the District Council, if there be one.
- Sec. 5. There may be a District Council in each District comprised of the Dean, other officers determined by the District, and additional members, the number and method of election of whom shall be determined by the District, taking into consideration the various interests to be represented within the District.
- Sec. 6. Each District, meeting in Convocation, may make by-laws, not inconsistent with the Canons, for the conduct of its own affairs and those of its District Council, if there be one.

Canon XVIII.

Of the Budget of the Diocese and the Diocesan Mission Apportionment.

- Sec. 1. The Diocesan Board shall prepare an annual budget for consideration by the Diocese. Expenditures shall be divided into mandatory and non-mandatory categories.
- (a) Expenditures identified as mandatory shall include only those items of expenditures deemed appropriate:
 - (i) to the discharge of the Ecclesiastical functions of the Office of the Episcopate in the Diocese;
 - (ii) to the conduct of the Diocesan Convention and to the participation of the Diocese in the General Convention and in the Provincial Synod, and in the Lambeth Conference; and
 - (iii) to the payment of financial support of the Episcopal Church. All such financial support provided by the Diocese to the Episcopal Church Shall be consistent with resolutions adopted by General Convention. For the period January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2018, consistent with the resolution adopted by General Convention, a flat rate shall apply as follows: 18% for calendar year 2016; 16.5% for 2017 and 15% for 2018.
- (b) Mandatory expenditures shall be identified by a separate tabulation, or equivalent means. The mandatory expenditures shall be met from endowment income restricted to these purposes and the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment assessed upon each parish.
 - (c) All other Diocesan expenditures shall be non-mandatory.
- Sec. 2. The Diocesan Board, as a first step, shall prepare a draft unified budget. Such draft budget shall be presented to all Members of Convention by mail and or by electronic communication; and as appropriate, by Regional meetings in the Diocese; to facilitate, review and respond.
- Sec. 3. Thereafter the Diocesan Board shall prepare a proposed unified budget and shall submit such budget to the Diocesan Convention.
- Sec. 4. The Diocesan Convention may make changes to the proposed budget by a two-thirds vote of its members present and voting. On approval by the Convention, the budget so approved shall become the budget for the Diocese for the ensuing calendar year, provided however, that the Diocesan Board shall have authority from time to time to make such adjustments thereto, as to items of either income or expenditures or both, as it deems necessary and appropriate to accommodate changes that occur after the approval by the Convention.
- Sec. 5. After approval of the budget by Diocesan Convention, the Diocesan Board shall have authority and responsibility to determine, and thereafter to adjust, the Diocesan Mission Apportionment of each of the parishes of the Diocese to fund the budget and to designate the portion thereof that shall be mandatory. In making such apportionment the Board shall use a uniform percentage applied to the average of the income of each parish for the

preceding three years, provided that in determining the non-mandatory portion of the apportionment the percentage may be set higher to compensate for predictable shortfalls based on historical giving patterns. Income shall be defined as all parish income, including but not limited to, income from pledges and plate collections, net receipts from special parish projects, and investment income, but excluding income or receipts designated for non-operating expenses or for purposes external to the parish, and shall not include proceeds from the sale of property, receipts from capital drives, loans, diocesan aid or shared clergy compensation received from another religious body, or gifts or bequests designated for capital improvements or as trust principal by the donor or by the vestry in the year of such receipt. The Board shall inform the parishes of the apportionments so made.

Sec 6. The Diocesan Board shall have authority and responsibility to make expenditures of Diocesan moneys in accordance with the budget as approved by the Diocesan Convention and subsequently adjusted by the Board.

Sec. 7. The Secretary of the Diocesan Convention shall prepare, before the opening of each Convention, a list of those parishes that are in arrears in the payment of the mandatory portion of the Diocesan Mission Apportionment with the amount of such arrears for the preceding calendar year and the same shall be placed in the hands of the Convention Committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates. Each such parish shall be excluded from representation in the Convention until such arrears have been paid in full or have been remitted by the Convention for satisfactory reasons. Application for remission of arrears shall be made no later than thirty days prior to the Convention to the Diocesan Board in the first instance, and the recommendations of the Board with respect thereto shall be reported to the Convention.

Canon XIX.

Of the Church Pension Fund.

- Sec. 1. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall provide for the annual payment of the premiums assessed on salaries paid directly by the Diocese to the Bishops and other clergy employed by the Diocese.
- Sec. 2. (a) The Secretary of the Convention, whenever required, shall furnish or cause to be furnished to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the members of the clergy of this Diocese, and of the members of the clergy canonically belonging to other dioceses who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each from any parish or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese.
- (b) The Secretary shall inform the Church Pension Fund or cause it to be informed of the members of the clergy and widows and minor orphans of members of the clergy canonically connected with this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.
- Sec. 3. Every member of the clergy receiving a stipend or stipends and every parish or other Ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, shall furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Treasurer of the Diocese whenever the Treasurer of the Diocese shall, in writing, ask for such statement, and shall furnish to the Treasurer of the Diocese a statement of such stipend or stipends and the name and address of the treasurer and the name of the rector or minister-in-charge whenever there occurs any change in such stipend, treasurer, rector, or minister-in-charge.
- Sec. 4. The Secretary of the Convention shall prepare, before the opening of the Annual Convention, a list of such parishes as are in arrears to the Church Pension Fund, with the amount of such arrears for the period prior to January first preceding, and the same shall be placed in the hands of the committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates. Each such parish shall be excluded from representation in the Convention until such arrears are paid in full.

Canon XX.

Of Diocesan Corporations.

- Sec. 1. The Diocese of Central New York. The members of the Diocesan Board shall be the trustees of the corporation.
- Sec. 2. The Foundation of the Diocese. The directors of the corporation shall be not less than seven nor more than twenty-five persons, as prescribed in the By-laws of the corporation, elected by the Convention annually on nomination of the Bishop (or Ecclesiastical Authority). The Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall be ex-officio directors of the corporation. Vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be filled for the unexpired term by a majority of the remaining directors.
- Sec. 3. Unified Investment Fund. The members of the Diocesan Board shall be the directors of the corporation.
- Sec. 4. Thornfield Foundation, Inc. The members of the Diocesan Board shall be the directors of the corporation.
- Sec. 5. A person may serve as a trustee of one or more or all of the diocesan corporations at the same time.

Canon XXI.

Of the Calling of a Rector.

- Sec. 1. Whenever a parish is without a rector it shall be the duty of the governing body to give immediate notice thereof to the Bishop. The procedures to be followed in calling a rector shall comply with the requirements contained in the Canons of the General Convention and otherwise shall conform to the process therefore prescribed from time to time by the Bishop. If a call shall be extended to a member of the clergy of this Church, there shall be included an agreement of the governing body to pay the premiums as assessed by the Church Pension Fund.
- Sec. 2. Whenever a parish is without a rector, the Bishop shall appoint a member or members of the clergy of this Church to supply such parishes as have been reported to be without a rector at such time as may be deemed convenient and proper. Any parish thus supplied shall defray all the expenses incident to such occasional services.

Canon XXII.

Of Parish Registers, Parochial Reports and the Removal of Communicants from One Parish to Another.

- Sec. 1. The Parish Register, in which the minister is required by the Canons of the General Convention to record all Baptisms, Confirmations, Marriages, Burials and the names of Communicants, shall be provided by the governing body at the expense of the parish and shall be in the custody of the Rector or priest-in-charge for the purpose of such record. Every Parish Register, when it has been filled, shall be carefully pre-served by the governing body as a part of the records of the parish.
- Sec. 2. The record in the Parish Register shall specify the names and dates of birth of children baptized, with the names of parents and sponsors; the names of adults baptized and their chosen witnesses; the names of persons confirmed or received; the names of parties married and of two or more witnesses of the marriage, and the place where the marriage was solemnized; the names of persons buried; and also the date when each Rite was performed. The Parish Register shall also contain a list of the families and adult persons of the cure as far as practicable.
- Sec. 3. The governing body of a parish shall be jointly responsible with the Rector or priest-in-charge for an accurate record of communicants and baptized persons resident in the parish and that the record be available at the annual election of the parish and be submitted to the Bishop at the time of the Bishop's Visitation, together with such changes as have occurred since the previous report.

Sec. 4. No name shall be removed from the lists of communicants in the parish except by: (1) death, (2) removal by issuance of a certificate of membership or letter of transfer, or (3) disciplinary action by competent Authority. There shall be indicated on the list of communicants those (a) whose domicile is unknown and (b) who live in the community but are inactive.

Sec. 5. In order that the annual report of the ministers of parishes in this Diocese may contain the information which is required by the Canons of the General Convention, such annual reports shall be made out in accordance with the form therefore authorized by the General Convention, which reports shall be forwarded to the Secretary of the Diocesan Convention on or before March first in each year.

Sec. 6. In every case where a parish is without a rector, the Register contemplated by this Canon shall be kept by the governing body thereof, or by some person appointed by the governing body whose duty it shall also be to prepare and forward to the Bishop the Annual Parochial Report.

Sec. 7. No rector or priest-in-charge of any parish in the Diocese shall receive as a regular communicant, or enter upon the list of communicants the name of any person who has been a communicant in any other parish without a certificate of membership or letter of transfer from the parish to which the communicant last belonged. Except, however, if it shall appear that a communicant not under censure of Ecclesiastical discipline has not received a certificate to the list of communicants in the new parish, and written notice of this action shall be sent to the former parish.

Sec. 8. Any communicant not under censure of Ecclesiastical discipline shall be entitled to such a certificate of membership or letter of transfer on application therefore to the rector or priest-in-charge of the parish to which the communicant belongs, and in case of a vacancy in the pastoral cure of a parish, and in case of any person under discipline, the application shall be referred to the Bishop of the Diocese, or, if the Episcopal office be vacant, to the President of the Standing Committee, and the answer and decision of the Bishop or of the President of the Standing Committee as above provided shall be final.

Canon XXIII.

Of Parishes and Diocesan Properties.

In conformity and consistent with the provisions of the Canons of the General Convention, it is hereby explicitly reaf-firmed that all real and personal property held by or for the benefit of any mission, chapel, or congregation located in the Diocese of Central New York is held in trust for the Episcopal Church and The Diocese of Central New York. The existence of this trust, however, shall in no way limit the power and authority of the parish, chapel, or congregation, or the power and authority of the Trustees of the Diocese holding title thereto, otherwise existing over such property so long as the particular mission, chapel, or congre-gation remains a part of, and subject to, The Episcopal Church and the Diocese of Central New York and the Constitution and Canons of each of them.

Canon XXIV.

Of the Dissolution of the Pastoral Relation.

Sec. 1. Subject to the provisions of Section 2 of this Canon, a priest who after January 1, 1986 is canonically elected rector of a parish and the vestry that elects such priest may, with consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, at the time of such election enter into a written agreement specify-ing the term for which the priest is to serve as rector of the parish. Not earlier than six months nor later than three months prior to the expiration of the term agreed on, the rector and the vestry may, with the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, by written instrument further extend the term for which the priest is to serve as rector. Subsequent extensions may similarly be made. The failure of either the priest or the vestry to agree to any such exten-sion at least three months

prior to the expiration of the term previously agreed on or extended shall constitute a failure to agree on any further extension.

Sec. 2. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this Canon, the provisions of the Canons of the General Convention concerning dissolution of the pastoral relation (as amended from time to time) shall apply in this diocese in the event no agreement is made pursuant to Section 1 of this Canon and as well during the term of any agreement so made or extended, but the relevant provisions of the Canons of General Convention shall not apply to preclude dissolution of the pastoral relation at the end of the term so agreed on or extended.

Canon XXV.

Of the Fiscal Year and Reports to the Convention.

- Sec. 1. The fiscal year of the Diocese shall begin on the first day of January in each year, and the Treasurer of the Diocese and all trustees having in charge any funds belonging to the Diocese shall make their reports annually to the Secretary of Convention at least four months before the meeting of the Convention in each year.
- Sec. 2. All special committees appointed by one Convention to report to the next Convention shall send their report, certificate of membership or letter of transfer within six months after request therefore, the name of such person shall be added to the list of communicants in the new parish, and written notice of this action shall be sent to the former parish.
- Sec. 8. Any communicant not under censure of Ecclesiastical discipline shall be entitled to such a certificate of membership or letter of transfer on application therefore to the rector or priest-in-charge of the parish to which the communicant belongs, and in case of a vacancy in the pastoral cure of a parish, and in case of any person under discipline, the application shall be referred to the Bishop of the Diocese, or, if the Episcopal office be vacant, to the President of the Standing Committee, and the answer and decision of the Bishop or of the President of the Standing Committee as above provided shall be final.

Canon XXVI.

Of Episcopal Offerings

At the Episcopal Visitations, each parish shall take an offering, which shall be given to and used at the discretion of the Bishop.

Canon XXVII.

Of Ecclesiastical Discipline of Members of the Clergy not being Bishops.

- Sec. 1. All matters with respect to Ecclesiastical Discipline of members of the clergy not being Bishops in the Diocese of Central New York shall be governed by the relevant provisions of Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention, as amended from time to time, which provisions are hereby incorporated by reference.
- Sec. 2. (a) There shall be a Disciplinary Board, elected by the Diocesan Convention, consisting of nine (9) members; five (5) of whom shall be clergy, retired or active, canonically and geographically resident in the Diocese, and four (4) of whom shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing and geographically resident and domiciled in the Diocese. The members of the Board shall be elected for three (3) year terms, arranged in three (3) classes, and serve no more than two (2) consecutive, three (3) year terms. The term shall begin at the close of Convention. No member shall be eligible for reelection for one (1) year after two (2) consecutive terms.
- (b) The Ecclesiastical Court shall continue to function as provided in the current Diocesan Canon XXVII, Sec. 2 until the new Title IV takes effect July 1, 2011. The Disciplinary Board will commence on July 1, 2011 and the

current Ecclesiastical Court will cease to exist, except to conclude any matters pending before it. The Disciplinary Board that will serve beginning on July 1, 2011 until Convention in November, 2011 will be appointed by the Bishop Diocesan in consultation with the Standing Committee and announced at Convention 2011. At the November 2011 Diocesan Convention all persons to serve on the Disciplinary Board will be elected by Convention in staggered terms and arranged in three classes, the terms of the first of which will expire in 2012, that of the second expiring in 2013 and that of the third expiring in 2014.

- (c) Vacancies on the Disciplinary Board shall be filled as follows: Upon the determination that a vacancy exists, the President of the Board shall notify the Bishop Diocesan of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced. The Bishop Diocesan, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, shall appoint a replacement Board member who meets the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Board members. This person will serve until the next Diocesan Convention at which time the position will be filled by the election of Convention for the balance of the term of the replaced Board member. A Board member may be removed from office by the Bishop Diocesan, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, whenever in the judgment of the Bishop Diocesan the best interests of the Diocese would be served thereby.
- (d) Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Disciplinary Board shall convene to elect a President from among its members to serve for the following calendar year, Provided that in the case of the initial appointment of members, the members shall meet and select a President prior to July 1, 2011 to serve until Diocesan Convention 2011. Education and training in the requirements of Title IV shall be conducted within the same period under the Direction of the Bishop Diocesan.
- (e) The Panels of the Disciplinary Board are comprised as follows: the Reference Panel is made up of the President of the Disciplinary Board, the Bishop Diocesan and the Intake Officer; the Conference Panel and the Hearing Panel shall be chosen by the President of the Disciplinary Board from among its members. Persons who are members of the Disciplinary Board may serve on either Panel, but no one person can serve on both the Conference Panel and the Hearing Panel for a single matter.
- (f) In any proceedings under Title IV, if there is any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel that becomes aware of a personal conflict of interest or bias, that member shall immediately notify the President of the Board and request a replacement member of the Panel. Respondent, Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The members of the Panel not the subjects of the challenge shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in that matter.
- Sec. 3. (a) The Intake Officer is the initial Diocesan contact person regarding the reporting of Offenses involving possible ecclesiastical discipline. This person is empowered to conduct a preliminary investigation and is required to submit a written intake-report, copied to the Reference Panel and the Church Attorney, advising one of the following courses of action:
 - (1) If the information from the Complainant is not true, or, if the information is true but would not constitute an Offense, as determined by the Intake Officer, the Intake Officer shall report in writing to the Reference Panel and the Church Attorney an intention to dismiss. Under these circumstances the Intake Officer may retain copies of documents for consideration if additional information surfaces regarding the involved cleric. In case of the Complainant's appeal of this decision, it is the responsibility of the Intake Officer to assist the Complainant in preparation of the appeal, which will be forwarded to the President of the Disciplinary Board, who will affirm or overrule the dismissal.
 - (2) If the information from the Complainant is true, and would be an Offense, the Intake Officer will promptly refer the complaint in a written report to the Reference Panel for Referral.
- (b) There shall be two Intake Officers, of different genders, in the Diocese, one of which to be a member of the clergy and the other of the lay order. The responsibilities and authority of the Intake Officer are limited to this

Diocese. Neither the Bishop Diocesan nor the Church Attorney, nor any member of their respective staffs, shall serve as Intake Officer.

- (c) The Intake Officer, upon invitation, may appear before any of the Boards or Panels described in these canons, but, with the exception of the Reference Panel, may not serve on any other of these said Boards or Panels in any formal elected or appointed position.
- (d) So as to conform to the July, 2011 implementation date mandated by General Convention, the following two-stage method of appointment shall be employed:
 - (1) The Intake Officers shall be appointed by the Bishop Diocesan, in consultation with the Standing Committee, to a term of office which expires at the convening of the 2011 Diocesan Convention, unless an investigation is ongoing, in which case the term of the investigating Intake Officer expires with the completion of that Officer's completion of duties concerning that investigation.
 - (2) At the 2011 Diocesan Convention, the Bishop Diocesan, in consultation with the Standing Committee, will appoint the Intake Officers, whose term of office shall be three (3) years, renewable for one succeeding three-year term.
- Sec. 4. The Bishop Diocesan, in consultation with the Standing Committee, shall appoint, on an annual basis, an attorney or attorneys to serve as Church Attorney (s). The person (s) so selected must be a duly licensed attorney in the State of New York. No person serving as Chancellor, Vice Chancellor or member of the Standing Committee, or any attorney affiliated in the practice of law with said persons, shall be eligible to serve as Church Attorney. Payment to the Church Attorney shall be pursuant to a written Retainer Agreement with the Diocese. In the course of his or her duties the Church Attorney may also consult with the President of the Disciplinary Board. A Church Attorney may be removed from office by the Bishop for cause, after the Church Attorney has had an opportunity to be heard by the Standing Committee. A vacancy in the office of Church Attorney shall be filled by the Bishop in consultation with the Standing Committee.
- Sec. 5. The Bishop Diocesan shall make Advisors available to the Respondent and to the Complainant at the times prescribed in and subject to the restrictions provided in Title IV.19.10. Advisor shall mean a person designated to support, assist, consult with and advise a Complainant or Respondent in any matter of discipline under this Title and the rights, responsibilities, consequences and alternatives pertaining thereto. Complainants and Respondents shall be advised that Advisors are not intended to act as lawyers for them and should not be so considered by them. Respondents and Complainants are free to reject an Advisor who has been offered by the Bishop Diocesan and to select another of their own choosing.
- Sec. 6. The Disciplinary Board shall appoint a Board Clerk to assist the Board with records management and administrative support, who may be a member of the Board.
- Sec. 7. (a) The necessary costs, expenses and fees of the Disciplinary Board, Intake Officer, Investigator, Church Attorney, Board Clerk, Conference Panel, Hearing Panel, and Advisors made available by the Bishop Diocesan, and person designated by the Bishop Diocesan to be responsible for implementation of a pastoral response pursuant to Title IV.8 shall be the obligation of the Diocese.
- (b) In the event of a final Order dismissing the complaint, or by provisions of an Accord approved by the Bishop Diocesan, the reasonable defense fees and costs incurred by the Respondent may be paid or reimbursed by the Diocese, subject to such budgetary constraints as may be established by the Diocesan Board.
- Sec. 8. Any meeting required under these disciplinary canons, other than a hearing at which evidence may be taken or examined, may be conducted in person or through telephonic or other electronic communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can communicate with each other at the same time.

Sec. 9. The Disciplinary Board may in its discretion seek legal counsel as it deems appropriate or necessary, or request counsel for the parties before it to brief legal issues on which it may seek advice. Fees incurred by the Board in this connection are the obligation of the Diocese.

Rules of Order

(For conducting the business of the Convention of the Diocese)

First Day

- I. On the first day the order of business shall be:
- A. After opening prayers, the Presiding Officer having taken the chair, the Presiding Officer shall be informed of the presence or non-presence of a quorum, the knowledge of which shall be obtained from the registration of the clergy and lay delegates immediately before the opening of Convention, which registration shall be the responsibility of the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the prior Convention, or if there be neither, the Chancellor or Vice Chancellor of the Diocese.
- B. If a quorum be found in attendance, via, at least twenty clerical members entitled to vote in the Convention, and delegations from at least twenty parishes, the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention duly organized for business.
- C. The Secretary shall be elected, who may nominate one or more Assistant Secretaries to be approved by the Convention.
- D. The Diocesan Board shall report its recommendations on requests to remit arrearages to the mandatory portion of Diocesan Mission Apportionment, and action thereon shall be in order.
- E. The Committee on Credentials of Lay Delegates shall make its report, which shall include the number of parishes entitled to representation in the Convention, including the number of parishes which have been late in filing their Annual Parochial Report for the prior year but which have accompanied their late Reports with letters of explanation, thereby admitting them to representation. The Report shall also include the names of parishes which have failed to file a Parochial Report or to accompany a late Report with a letter of explanation. If unusual circumstances for such failure are explained, action shall be in order by a majority vote of the members of Convention present and voting to admit any of such parishes to Convention.
- F. The Presiding Officer shall report the announcement of the schedule and agenda of the Convention as contemplated by General Rule A.
- G. The Diocesan Unified Budget recommended by the Diocesan Board shall be presented by the Treasurer or by a member of the Board, with any comments deemed appropriate.
- H. The Bishop shall deliver an Annual Report, unless another time for its delivery has been determined by the Bishop.
- I. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, and the Bishop Suffragan, if there be one, shall deliver their addresses unless the Bishop has designated another time for their delivery.
- J. Resolutions shall be presented and referred to appropriate committees, or placed on the Convention Agenda without debate, but any resolution by unanimous consent may be acted on at this time.
- K. The Presiding Officer, or the person designated by the Presiding Officer, shall announce the procedures for nominations and elections (see Canon XVI).
- L. The Secretary shall report all nominations made pursuant to Canon XVI for offices to be filled by election of the Convention.
 - M. Additional nominations may be made from the floor of Convention.

- N. The Presiding Officer shall appoint tellers.
- O. The Presiding Officer shall make a last call for resolutions.
- P. The polls shall be opened and voting proceed.

Second Day

- II. On the second day the order of business shall be:
- A. The Committee on Memorials of Deceased Clergy shall make its report.
 - B. The memorial list of members of the Diocese shall be read.
 - C. An abstract of the proceedings of the Standing Committee of the Diocese shall be submitted.
 - D. Reports, including a statement of unfinished business and any special communication to the Convention, shall be made by the Secretary.
 - E. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall report.
 - F. Action shall be taken on the proposed Diocesan budget.
 - G. Committees of Convention shall make reports, which may be by title and action shall be taken There on, as appropriate.
 - H. Diocesan units and groups shall make reports and presentations, and action thereon taken as appropriate.
 - I. The Resolutions Committee shall make its report and action shall be taken thereon.
 - J. The Elections Committee shall make its report.
 - K. Unfinished business shall be considered.
 - L. Members of the Diocesan Board and of other Diocesan bodies shall be elected.
 - M. Appointments shall be made to standing committees of the Convention.
 - N. Announcements.
 - O. Adjournment.

Subsequent Days

III. On any subsequent day the order of business shall be the disposal of the unfinished business of the Convention in the order above prescribed for the Second Day; the business, if any, however, which was under consideration at the time of adjournment of the Convention shall be disposed of first.

General Rules

- IV. The following general rules shall apply to the Convention:
- A. The schedule and agenda of the Convention shall be determined by the Presiding Officer and to the extent practicable shall be announced prior to the opening of the Convention. The Convention shall have the right, however, by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Convention present and voting to modify or change such schedule or agenda or both, or to adopt a schedule or agenda or both.
 - B. The procedures for nominations and elections to be made by the Convention shall be as follows:
- (1) Each person in the clerical and in the lay order whose name appears in the brochure forwarded to the members of the Convention by the Secretary in conformity with the provisions of Canon XVI, Section

- 3, Paragraph (c) shall be deemed thereby to have been duly nominated for the office so indicated, and no member of the Convention shall be recognized to speak from the floor in his or her behalf.
- (2) Additional nominations may be made from the floor, in which event not more than one member of Convention shall be recognized to speak for not more than one minute on behalf of each additional nominee, and the content of such nominating speech shall be limited as provided in Canon XVI, Section 3, Paragraph (b), Subparagraph (ii).
- (3) The Presiding Officer shall appoint tellers, one for each order for each ballot box, together with a chair of tellers, who shall tally the votes of the Convention and report the results thereof.
- C. Resolutions may be offered to the Convention only by members of the Convention or by its committees. Resolutions of members of the Convention shall be presented no later than the end of the first session of the first day of Convention, unless later presentation is authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Convention present and voting. All resolutions shall be referred to the Resolutions Committee for review and report, except that resolutions presented by a committee of Convention need not be so referred. When a special committee has been assigned responsibility for a particular subject at Convention, all resolutions relating to that subject shall, on recommendation of the Resolutions Committee Chair, be referred to such special committee for its review and report. Each resolution presented by a committee of Convention, or being reported by a special committee thereof, shall first be submitted to the Resolutions Committee Chair for review and comment as to form and procedural aspects.
- D. Every member of the Convention present who is entitled to vote when a question is stated by the Presiding Officer shall vote thereon unless excused by the Convention.
- E. No motion shall be put or debated until it is seconded, and when seconded it shall be stated by the Presiding Officer before the debate; and every motion shall be reduced to writing when required by the Presiding Officer or requested by any member of the Convention.
- F. If the question in debate contains several distinct propositions, at the request of any member of the Convention the question shall be divided.
- G. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, except to vote immediately, to lay it on the table, to postpone it indefinitely, to postpone it to a certain time, to commit it, to amend it, and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order here set forth. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order when no member of the Convention is speaking, and shall be decided without debate, and if it be defeated shall not be renewed until some other business has intervened.
- H. A motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate; but any matter thus laid on the table maybe called up again during the same Convention on the motion of any member of the Convention who voted in the affirmative.
- I. On the question being put by the Presiding Officer it shall be determined in the manner prescribed by the Presiding Officer; but at the request of any member of the Convention a count of the votes shall be taken, and tellers for that purpose shall be appointed by the Presiding Officer, or at the request of any ten members of the Convention prior to a decision by count, the ayes and nays shall be taken by calling the names of the clerical members and of the lay delegates of the parishes represented, and the votes shall be entered on the minutes.
- J. At the request of any ten members of the Convention the ayes and nays shall be taken by orders and when so taken they shall be entered on the minutes, and the concurrence of a majority in each order of those present and voting shall be required for adoption.
- K. No member of the Convention or person entitled to the privilege of the floor shall speak more than twice for more than five minutes on each occasion on the same question without leave of the Convention, except that this Rule shall not limit the presentation of reports on behalf of committees or Diocesan units.

- L. A question that has been decided shall not be reconsidered during the same Convention without the consent of two-thirds of the members of the Convention present and voting, nor without the motion for that purpose being made by a member of the Convention who voted in the majority on the prior decision; nor shall any question be reconsidered more than once.
- M. All reports of committees shall be in writing and shall, on reading or presentation, become the property of the Convention without any motion for acceptance, and any report recommending action by the Convention shall be accompanied by a proposed resolution.
- N. At each Diocesan Convention the privilege of the floor shall be extended to the Sisters of St. Margaret, to members of the clergy licensed to officiate in the Diocese and to all official youth representatives and members of WINGS for Youth or other similar organization designated by the Bishop. Official youth representatives shall be invited to sit with their parish delegates.
- O. All special committees shall be appointed by the Bishop unless otherwise directed by the Convention in which case they shall be designated by majority vote of the members of the Convention present and voting.
 - P. Smoking shall not be permitted in the room or other facility in which the Convention is held.

Extracts From the Laws of New York

Note: Only selected statutory provisions are reprinted in this Supplement. In some instances only the relevant portions of sections are included. For the complete texts it is suggested that reference be made in the statutes themselves.

5. General powers and duties of trustees of religious corporations

The trustees of every religious corporation shall have the custody and control of all the temporalities and property, real and personal, belonging to the corporation and of the revenues there from, and shall administer the same in accordance with the discipline, rules and usages of the corporation and of the ecclesiastical governing body, if any to which the corporation is subject, and with

the provisions of law relating thereto, for the support and maintenance of the corporation, or providing the members of the corporation at a meeting thereof shall so authorize, of some religious, charitable benevolent or educational object conducted by said corporation or in connection with it, or with the denomination, if any which it is connected and they shall not use such property or revenues for any other purpose or divert the same from such uses. They may transfer all or any part of the real or personal estate of such corporation to such bank or trust company organized or existing under the laws of the state of New York, or to a national banking association whose principle office is located in the state of New York as may be designated by them or to a holding company, organized under the laws of the state of New York, of the same religious denomination, such property to be held in trust or in safekeeping or custody, to collect the income thereof and pay over the same to the trustees of such religious corporation at such times and in such manner as shall be agreed upon, and they may also, in their discretion, delegate and grant to the trustee of custodian designated by them all or any portion of the powers, responsibilities and discretionary authority possessed by them with respect to the retention and the investment and reinvestment of such property or any part thereof, and may from time to time modify such powers delegated by them or designate successor or different trustees or custodians within the limits and subjects to the regulations and restrictions contained in this section.

By-laws may be adopted or amended, by a two-thirds vote of the qualified voters present and voting at the meeting for incorporation or at any subsequent meeting, after written notice, embodying such by-laws or amendment, has been openly given at a previous meeting, and also in the notices of the meeting at which such proposed by-laws or amendment is to be acted upon. By-laws thus adopted or amended shall control the action of the trustees. But this section does not give to the trustees of an incorporated church, any control over the calling, settlement, dismissal or removal of its minister, or the fixing of his salary; or any power to fix or change the times, nature or order of the public or social worship of such church.

5-a. Investment of funds

Subject to the discipline, rules and usages of the corporation and of the ecclesiastical governing body, if any, to which the corporation is subject and subject to the limitations and conditions contained in any gift, devise or bequest,...the trustees of every religious corporation, created by or under a general or special law, may invest the funds of such corporation in such securities, investments or other property, real or personal, located within or without the state of New York, as to them shall seem advisable without being restricted to those classes of securities which are lawful for the investment of trust funds under the laws of this state...

12. Sale, mortgage and lease of real property of religious corporations

- 1. A religious corporation shall not sell, mortgage or lease for a term exceeding five years any of its real property without applying for and obtaining leave of the court therefore pursuant to section five hundred eleven of the not-for-profit corporation law as that section is modified by paragraph (d-1) of subsection one of section two-b of this chapter, except that a religious corporation may execute a purchase money mortgage or a purchase money security agreement creating a security interest in personal property purchased by it without obtaining leave of the court therefore.
- 2. The trustees of an incorporated Protestant Episcopal church shall not vote upon any resolution or proposition for the sale, mortgage or lease of its real property, unless the rector of such church, if it then has a rector, shall be present, and shall not make application to the court for leave to sell of mortgage any of its real property without the consent of the bishop and standing committee of the diocese to which such church belongs, or execute and deliver a lease of any of its real property for a term exceeding five years without similar consent of the bishop and standing committee of the diocese to which such church belongs; but in case the see be vacant, or the bishop be absent or unable to act, the consent of the standing committee with their certificate of vacancy of the see or of the absence of disability of the bishop shall suffice....

40. Meeting for incorporation

Notice of a meeting for the purpose of incorporating an unincorporated Protestant Episcopal parish or congregation, and of electing the first churchwardens and vestrymen thereof, shall specify the object, time and place of such meeting, and shall be made public for at least two weeks prior to such meeting, either by open reading of such notice in time of divine service, at the usual place of worship of such parish or congregation, or by posting the same conspicuously on the outer door of such place of worship. Only persons of full age who have been regular attendants at the worship of such parish or congregation and contributors to the support thereof for one year next prior to such meeting, or since the establishment of such parish or congregation, shall be qualified to vote at such meeting. The presence of at least six persons qualified to vote thereat shall be necessary to constitute a quorum of such meeting. The action of the meeting upon any matter of question shall be decided by a majority of the qualified voters voting thereon, a quorum being present. The officiating minister, or if there be none, or he shall be necessarily absent, any other person qualified to vote at the meeting, who is called to the chair, shall preside thereat. Such presiding officer shall receive the votes, be the judge of the qualifications of voters and declare the result of the votes cast at such meeting. The polls of the meeting shall remain open for one hour or longer, in the discretion of the presiding officer, or if required by a vote of the majority of the voters present. The meeting shall decide whether such unincorporated parish or congregation shall become incorporated. If such decision be in favor of incorporation, such meeting shall decide upon the name of the proposed corporation; what day, either a Sunday or secular day, shall be the date of the regular annual election; whether the vestrymen thereof shall be three, six, nine, twelve, fifteen, eighteen, twenty-one or twenty-four; and shall elect by ballot from the persons qualified to be voters thereat, who have been baptized, one-third of the number of vestrymen so decided upon to hold office until the first annual election to be held thereafter, one-third of such number, to hold office until one year after such annual election, and one-third of such number, to hold office until two years after such annual election; and shall elect from such qualified voters who are communicants in the Protestant Episcopal church, two persons to be churchwardens thereof, one to hold office until such annual election, and one to hold office until one year after such annual election.

41. Certificate of incorporation

If such meeting shall decide in favor of incorporation and comply with the next preceding section, the presiding officer of such meeting and at least two other persons present and voting thereat, shall execute and acknowledge a certificate of incorporation setting forth:

- 1. The fact of the calling and holding of such meeting;
- 2. The name of the corporation as deiced upon thereat;
- 3. The county and the town, city or village, in which its principal place of worship is, or is intended to be located:
- 4. The day, either on Sunday or a secular day, upon which the annual election shall be held;
- 5. The number of vestrymen decided upon at such meeting;
- 6. The names of vestrymen elected at such meeting and the term of office of each;
- 7. The names of the churchwardens elected at such meeting and the term of office of each.

Such certificate, when accompanied by a certificate of the bishop of the diocese within which the principal place of worship of the proposed corporation is, or is intended to be located, to the effect that he consents to the incorporation of such church, shall be filed in the office of the clerk of the county specified in the certificate of incorporation; but in case the see be vacant, or the bishop be absent or unable to act, the consent of the standing committee, with their certificate of the vacancy of the see of the absence of disability of the bishop, shall suffice.

On filing such certificate in the office of the clerk of the county so specified therein the church wardens and vestrymen so elected and their successors in office, together with the rector, when there is one, shall form a vestry and shall be the trustees of such church or congregation; and they and their successors shall thereupon, by virtue of this chapter, be a body corporate by the name or title expressed

in such certificate, and shall have power, from time to time to adopt by-laws for its government. Such corporation shall be an incorporated church, and may be termed also an incorporated parish.

42. Corporate trustees, vestry; powers and duties thereof

No meeting of the vestry or trustees of any incorporated Protestant Episcopal parish or church shall be held unless either all the members thereof are present, or three days' notice thereof shall be given to each member thereof, by the rector in writing either personally or by mail, or if there be no rector or he be incapable of acting, by one of the churchwardens; except that twenty-four hours; notice of the first meeting of the vestry or trustees after an annual election shall be sufficient, provided such meeting be held within three days after the election. In the event of the rector of a parish or church refusing or neglecting to call a meeting of the vestry or trustees of any incorporated Protestant Episcopal church, on the written request of two-thirds of all the wardens and vestrymen of the parish, the clerk of the vestry shall call a meeting of the same by giving at least fifteen days' written notice to be served on each member of the vestry personally; if personal service cannot be had, then upon such member by mailing the notice to his last known place of residence. To constitute a quorum of the vestry or board of trustees, there must be present either:

- 1. The rector and at least a majority of the whole number of wardens and vestrymen, or
- 2. One churchwarden and one more than a majority of the vestrymen or both churchwardens and a majority of the vestrymen, or
- 3. If the rector be absent from the diocese and shall have been so absent for over four calendar months, of if the meeting be called by the rector and he be absent there from or be incapable of acting, one churchwarden and a majority of the vestrymen, or both church wardens and one less than a majority of the vestrymen. But if there be a rector of the parish, no measure shall be taken, in his absence, in any case, for effecting the sale or disposition of the real property of the corporation, nor for the sale or disposition of the capital or principal of the personal property of the corporation, nor shall any act be done which shall impair the rights of such rector. The presiding officer of the vestry or trustees shall be the rector, or if there be none, or he be absent, the churchwarden who shall be called to the chair by a majority of the votes, if both the churchwardens be present; or the churchwarden present, if but one be present. At each meeting of the vestry or trustees each member thereof shall be entitled to one vote. The vestry shall have power to fill a vacancy occurring in the office of a churchwarden or vestryman by death, resignation or otherwise than by expiration of term, until the next annual election, at which, if such vacancy would continue thereafter, it shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term. If vacancies exist in the offices of churchwardens or vestrymen in such number that a guorum of the vestry or board of trustees is not in office at any time, the rector shall forthwith call a special election for the filling of such vacancies. If there be no rector, the churchwarden longest in office shall call such special election. Notice of such special election shall be read by the rector, or if there be none, or he be absent, by the officiating minister or by one of the churchwardens, on the Sunday next preceding such election, in the time of divine service. If for any reason the usual place of worship of the parish be not open for divine service on such Sunday such notice shall be posted conspicuously on the outer door of the place of worship for one week next preceding the election. Such notice shall conform to that required for an annual election. The provisions of section forty-three of this chapter relating to annual elections shall apply to such special election, except as inconsistent herewith. Such vacancies shall be filled at such election for the remainder of the unexpired terms. The vestry may, subject to the canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, and of the diocese in which the parish or church is situated, by a majority vote, elect a rector to fill the vacancy occurring in the rector ship of the parish, and may fix the salary or compensation of the rector.

42-a Additional powers of the corporate trustees and vestry

Notwithstanding and in addition to the provisions of section five of this chapter, and subject always to the trust in which all real and personal property is held for the Protestant Episcopal Church and the Diocese thereof in which the parish, mission or congregation is located, the vestry or trustees of any incorporated Protestant Episcopal parish or church, the trustees of every incorporated governing body of the Protestant Episcopal Church and each diocese are authorized to administer the temporalities and property, real and personal, belonging to the corporation, for the support and maintenance of the corporation and, provided it is in accordance with the discipline, rules and usages of the Protestant Episcopal Church and with the provisions relating thereto, for the support and maintenance of other religious, charitable, benevolent or educational objects whether or not conducted by the corporation or in connection with it or with the Protestant Episcopal Church. (Added L. 1991)

43. Annual election and special meetings of incorporated Protestant Episcopal parishes

- 1. The annual election of a Protestant Episcopal parish, hereafter incorporated, shall be held on the day either a Sunday or secular day, designated in its certificate of incorporation.
- 2. The annual election of an incorporated Protestant Episcopal parish or church heretofore incorporated shall be held on the day fixed for such annual election, by or in pursuance of law, or if no such date be so fixed, then on such day, either a Sunday or a secular day, as may be determined by vote of the vestry.
- 3. Special meetings of any Protestant Episcopal parish or church heretofore or hereafter incorporated may be held on any Sunday or secular day fixed by the vestry.
- 4. Notice of such annual election or special meeting shall be read by the rector of the parish, or if there be none, or he be absent, by the officiating minister or by a church warden thereof, on each of the two Sundays next preceding such election or special meeting, in the time of divine service, or if, for any reason, the usual place of worship of the parish be not open for divine service, the notice shall be posted conspicuously on the outer door of the place of worship for two weeks next preceding the election or special meeting. Such notice shall specify the place, day and hour of holding the election or special meeting. The notice of the annual election shall also specify the number and terms of office of each church warden and the vestrymen whose terms of office shall then expire, or whose office shall then be vacant for any cause, and the office for which each such officer is to be then elected. The notice of a special meeting shall specify the matter or question to be brought before such meeting and no matter or question not specified in such notice shall be acted on at such meeting.
- 5. The presiding officer of such annual or special meeting shall be the rector of the parish, if there be one, or if there be none, or he be absent, one of the church wardens elected for the purpose by a majority of the duly qualified voters present, or if no church warden be present, a vestryman elected in like manner. Such presiding officer shall be the judge of the qualifications of the voters; shall receive the votes cast; and shall declare the result of the votes cast. The presiding officer of such annual or special meeting shall enter the proceedings of the meeting in the book of the minutes of the vestry, sign his name thereto, and offer the same to as many qualified voters present as he shall think fit, to be also signed by them.
- 6. Persons of full age belonging to the parish, who have been baptized and are regular attendants at its worship and contributors to its support for at least twelve months prior to such election or special meeting or since the establishment of such parish, shall be qualified voters at any such election or special meeting. Whenever so permitted by the canons of the diocese, persons of less than full age, but of the age of eighteen years or more, and having like qualifications except as to age, may vote at the annual elections and special meetings of any parish of such diocese, whenever such parish shall so determine in the manner provided in said section forty-six.
 - 7. The action of an annual or special meeting upon any matter or question shall be decided by

a majority of the qualified voters voting thereon. The polls of an election shall continue open for one hour and longer in the discretion of the presiding officer, or if required by a vote of a majority of the qualified voters present and voting. The church wardens and vestrymen shall be elected by ballot from persons qualified to vote at such election, and no person shall be eligible for election as church warden, unless that person be also a confirmed communicant in the Protestant Episcopal Church, or be eligible for election as vestryman, unless that person shall have been baptized. Whenever so permitted by the canons of the diocese persons of less than full age but of the age of eighteen years or more and having like qualifications except as to age, shall be eligible for election as church warden or vestryman in any parish, whenever such parish shall so determine in the manner provided.

- 8. At each annual election of an incorporated Protestant Episcopal parish hereafter incorporated, one church warden shall be elected to hold office for two years; and one-third of the total number of vestrymen of the parish shall be elected to hold office for three years.
- 9. At each annual election of an incorporated Protestant Episcopal parish or church heretofore incorporated, two church wardens and the total number of its vestrymen shall be elected to hold office for one year thereafter, unless the term of office of but one church warden or of but one-third of its vestrymen shall then expire, in which case one church warden shall be elected to hold office for two years, and one-third of the total number of its vestrymen shall be elected to hold office for three years.
- 10. Each church warden and vestryman shall hold office after expiration of his term until his successor shall be chosen.

Changing the qualifications of voters and the qualifications of wardens and vestrymen

I f the vestry of a Protestant Episcopal parish heretofore incorporated shall by resolution recommend that the qualifications of voters and the qualifications of wardens and vestrymen be changed to conform in both cases to the requirements of section forty-three of this chapter, notice of such recommendation shall be included in the notice of the next annual election of such parish, and be submitted to the meeting. If such recommendation be ratified by such meeting the presiding officer thereof and at least two qualified voters present thereat shall execute and acknowledge a certificate setting forth such resolution of the vestry, the fact that notice thereof had been given with the notice of such annual election, and that the meeting had ratified the same. Such certificate shall be filed in the office of the clerk of the county in which the original certificate of incorporation is filed and recorded.

48. Legacies

Any device or bequest of real or personal property to an unincorporated parish, mission, congregation, chapel or religious society under the jurisdiction of or in communion with the Protestant Episcopal Church, for the purposes of such gift, may be taken, held and administered for the benefit of such devisee or legatee by the diocesan corporation of the diocese in which such devisee or legatee is situate, and such diocesan corporation shall have the power, subject to the provisions of article five of the not-for-profit corporation law and of section twelve of this chapter, to lease, improve, mortgage, sell, convey and transfer any property so held.

49. Eligibility of certain minors as lay delegates and to vote and hold office

Whenever the constitution or canons of a diocese of the Protestant Episcopal church in the state of New York so permit, persons of less than full age but of the age of eighteen years or more shall be eligible to serve as lay delegates to and to vote at any convention of the diocese, when duly chosen by the parish or mission and shall also be eligible for election to or appointment to any lay office of the diocese.

[Effective September 1, 1972], certain provision of the Not-For-Profit-Corporations Law are made applicable to religious corporations. For applicability see Not-For-Profit-Corporations Law 103 and Religious Corporations Law 2-b.]

Domestic Relations Law

By Whom a Marriage Must Be Solemnized

11. By whom a marriage must be solemnized

No marriage shall be valid unless solemnized by either:

1. A clergyman or minister of any religion,

Note: A clergyman or minister of any religion having authority of his denomination, order, church or synagogue may solemnize marriages in this state whether or not ordained, a resident of this state or occupying a pulpit, and there is not statutory provision relative to the age at which one may solemnize a marriage.

Marriage Licenses

13. Marriage licenses

It shall be necessary for all persons intended to be married in New York State to obtain a marriage license from a town or city clerk in New York State and to deliver said license, within sixty days, to the clergyman or magistrate who is to officiate before the marriage ceremony may be performed...

14. Town and city clerks to issue marriage licenses; from...

There shall be endorsed upon the license or annexed thereto at the end thereof, subscribed by the clerk, an abstract of the facts concerning the parties disclosed in their affidavits or verified statements at the time of the application for the license made in conformity to the provisions of section fifteen of this chapter.

There shall also be stated upon the license the exact period during which the marriage may be solemnized. The license issued, including the abstract of facts, and the certificate duly signed by the person who shall have solemnized the marriage therein authorized, shall be returned by him...to the office of the town or city clerk who issued the license within five days succeeding the date of the solemnizing of the marriage therein authorized and any person or persons who shall willfully neglect to make such return within the time above required shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars or more than fifty dollars for each and every offense.

Marriage of Minors

15. Duty of town and city clerks...

2. If it appears from the affidavits and statements so taken, that the persons for whose marriage the license in question is demanded are legally competent to marry, the said clerk shall issue such

license except in the following cases. If it shall appear upon an application that the applicant is under eighteen years of age, before the town or city clerk shall issue a license, he shall require documentary proof of age...If it shall appear upon an application of the applicants as provided in this section or upon any information required by the clerk that either party is at least sixteen years of age but under eighteen years of age, then the town or city clerk before he shall issue a license shall require the written consent to the marriage from both parents of the minor or minors or such as shall then be living, or if the parents of both are dead, then the written consent of the guardian or guardians of such minor or minors....

3. If it shall appear upon an application for a marriage license that either party is under the age of sixteen years, the town or city clerk shall require, in addition to the consents provided for in this section, the written approval and consent of a justice of the supreme court or of a judge of the family court, having jurisdiction over the town or city in which the application is made, to be attached to or endorsed upon the application, before the license is issued....

15-a. Marriages of minors under sixteen years of age

Any marriage in which either party is under the age of sixteen years is hereby prohibited....

Penalty and Protection for Clergyman

17. Clergyman or officer violating article; penalty

If any clergyman or other person authorized by the laws of this state to perform marriage ceremonies shall solemnize or presume to solemnize any marriage between any parties without a license being presented to him or them as herein provided or with knowledge that either party is legally incompetent to contract matrimony as is provided for in this article he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not less than fifty dollars nor more than five hundred dollars or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year.

18. Clergyman or officer, when protected

Any such clergyman or officer as aforesaid to whom any such license duly issued may come and not having personal knowledge of the incompetency of either party therein named to contract matrimony, may lawfully solemnize matrimony between them.

Note: A clergyman performing a m marriage ceremony is not required to investigate the qualifications of the parties further than to ascertain that the proper license has been issued to them which by this section fully protects him provided he does not have personal knowledge of the incompetency of either party.

Time Limits Within Which Marriages May Be Solemnized

13-b. Time within which marriage may be solemnized

A marriage shall not be solemnized within twenty-four hours after the issuance of the marriage license, unless authorized by an order of a court of record as hereinafter provided, nor shall it be solemnized after sixty days from the date of the issuance of the marriage license. Every license to marry hereafter issued by a town or city clerk, in addition to other requirements specified by this chapter, must

contain a statement of the day and the hour the license is issued and the period during which the marriage may be solemnized. It shall be the duty of the clergyman . . . performing the marriage ceremony . . . to annex to or endorse upon the marriage license the date and hour the marriage is solemnized. A judge or justice of the supreme court of this state or the county judge of the county in which either party to be married resides, or if such party is under sixteen years of age, the judge of the family court of such county, if it shall appear from an examination of the license and any other proofs submitted by the parties that one of the parties is in danger of imminent death, or by reason of other emergency public Interest will be promoted thereby, or that such delay will work irreparable injury or great hardship upon the contracting parties, or one of them, may make an order authorizing the immediate solemnization of the marriage and upon filing such order with the clergyman . . . performing the marriage ceremony . . . such clergyman may solemnize such marriage without waiting for such three day period and twenty-four hour period to elapse. The clergyman . . . must file such order with the town or city clerk who issued the license within five days after the marriage is solemnized. Such town or city clerk must record and index the order in the book required to be kept by him for recording affidavits, statements, consents and licenses, and when so recorded the order shall become a public record and available in any prosecution under this section. A person who shall solemnize a marriage in violation of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of fifty dollars for each offense, and in addition thereto, his right to solemnize a marriage shall be suspended for ninety days.

Marriage-How Solemnized

12. Marriage-How solemnized

No particular form or ceremony is required when a marriage is solemnized as herein provided by a clergyman or magistrate, but the parties must solemnly declare in the presence of a clergyman or magistrate and the attending witness or witnesses that they take each other as husband and wife. In every case, at least one witness besides the clergyman or magistrate must be present at the ceremony....

Note: An attempt by a clergyman or magistrate to perform a marriage ceremony by radio without being actually present with the parties would be in derogation of this section.

Section A. Constitution and Canons for the Government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the USA: Title I, Canon 7: — Of Business Methods in Church Affairs

CANON 7: Of Business Methods in Church Affairs

Section 1. In every Province, Diocese, Parish, Mission and Institution connected with this Church, the

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- (g) All reports of such audits, including any memorandum issued by the auditors or audit committee regarding internal controls or other accounting matters, together with a summary of action taken or proposed to be taken to correct deficiencies or implement recommendations contained in any such memorandum, shall be filed with the Bishop or Ecclesiastical Authority not later than 30 days following the date of such report, and in no event, not later than September 1 of each year, covering the financial reports of the previous calendar year.
 - (h) All buildings and their contents shall be kept adequately insured.
- (i) The Finance Committee or Department of Finance of the Diocese may require copies of any or all accounts described in this Section to be filed with it and shall report annually to the Convention of the Diocese upon its administration of this Canon.
 - (j) The fiscal year shall begin January 1.
- **Section 2.** The several Dioceses shall give effect to the foregoing standard business methods by the enactment of Canons appropriate thereto, which Canons shall invariably provide for a Finance Committee, a Department of Finance of the Diocese, or other appropriate diocesan body with such authority.
- **Section 3**. No Vestry, Trustee, or other Body, authorized by Civil or Canon law to hold, manage, or administer real property for any Parish, Mission, Congregation, or Institution, shall encumber or alienate the same or any part thereof without the written consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese of which the Parish, Mission, Congregation, or Institution is a part, except under such regulations as may be prescribed by Canon of the Diocese.
- **Section 4.** All real and personal property held by or for the benefit of any Parish, Mission or Congregation is held in trust for this Church and the Diocese thereof in which such Parish, Mission or Congregation is located. The existence of this trust, however, shall in no way limit the power and authority of the Parish, Mission or Congregation otherwise existing over such property so long as the particular Parish, Mission or Congregation remains a part of, and subject to, this Church and its Constitution and Canons.
- **Section 5.** The several Dioceses may, at their election, further confirm the trust declared under the foregoing Section 4 by appropriate action, but no such action shall be necessary for the existence and validity of the trust.

The Rev. Carrie Schofield-Broadbent's Address to the 148th Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Central New York November 12, 2016

It was a time when tensions were high and a lot was on the line.

The whole group of us was a bundle of anxiety. There were about 50 people in our first year of seminary. It was around this time of year and we were all gearing up for our first mid-term, in Old Testament class. We started the day like every other day, in chapel, and after the service ended, we made our way across the campus to the lecture hall en masse.

The room was set up in stadium seating with long tables; we found our seats. We glanced down at the table where the professor sat and stared at the pile of blue books that awaited us. Some of us quietly took a last-minute look at our notes. Some of us quietly quizzed one another and speculated on what would be on the test. A lot was riding on this. Most of us had left our homes, our jobs, some had even let their families to go to seminary to study for ministry. The story I was creating for myself out of my anxiety I imagine was shared with others: Am I cut out for this? Can I handle the academic world again? What I fail the test? What I fail the diocese? What if I fail God?!?

We were so absorbed in our own little worlds of anxiety that no one really noticed the commotion brewing behind us in the hall until the double doors on either side of the room flung open in unison.

We craned our necks to see streams of people flowing through the doors and making their way down the side aisles; upperclassmen (middlers and seniors), faculty and staff all flowed into the room until they circled us.

And then we heard this chord: G ... and we heard (sung to the tune of "American Pie")...

Bye, Bye, kiss the midterm goodbye.

No more crammin', now you're jammin'
and you're ready to fly.

And good ol' Jake was wrestlin' with Adonai,
Singing, "was the Red Sea really that dry"?? "Is this Zion or Sinai?"......

And there we were weepy, laughing, and broken open by the community that literally encircled us, holding us, holding our anxiety, being the vessel of the grace of God for us. In that big, small act of kindness and generosity, they released the tension in that room and replaced it with love and grace. By their presence, in that circle, they were physical reminders that we were not alone, that the big picture is so much bigger than

a mid-term exam and that God's Kingdom is real and here no matter how we did on that exam.

In our own, little worlds we couldn't have broken out of the anxiety ourselves. It took the gathered community to be bearers of God's grace for us, and it made all the difference.

For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

When I was in 7th grade, my parents dropped me off at a diocesan youth conference. I remember it was my parents' idea. I remember my mom bribing me to go with a new nightgown. I was easily bribed. There I was: 12 years old, not knowing anyone else there, getting ready for a weekend of church - penny loafers on my feet, acne that was only moderately controlled and a brand new Little House on the Prairie-style night-gown packed deep in my bag.

I wasn't an expert on much in that phase of my life, but I was an expert on being able to tell who was "in" and who was "out". If my suburban middle-school education taught me anything, it was that. You could just tell by the way a person carried themselves, by the clothes they wore, by how high they could get their bangs to go.... We all came from different schools, different churches, but we all knew within a matter of mere minutes who was cool in their school and who was not.

At my school, the cool kids were the inner circle, well, actually they were the only circle and the rest of the kids were just: on the outside. It took me a little while to catch on that in that community, at the youth conference, they handled that information way differently that the kids at my school did. In that community, in that setting, there was only one circle and all were welcome.

The kids there made it their job to make sure no one was excluded, and if someone wandered off from the circle, feeling insecure, insignificant, or just with a large dose of drama, a member of the group would pull them back into the circle, letting them know that not only did they fully belong in the circle, but in fact, the circle was not complete without them.

We can't find belonging by ourselves, we can only do that in community. We know that God knits us together in community to make ourselves better, and also as a way of showing his love for us through the grace, generosity and love of others.

For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

I became rector of St. Matthew's, Liverpool ten years ago. I came into that position carrying with me experiences from other positions I'd held. In some of the work environments in which I served, there was kind of a "culture of blame" that influenced me a great deal. Perhaps some of you have had experience with that too.... When something went wrong, the system rushed to figure out whose fault it was and who

needed to fix it.

There was a different spirit present at St. Matthew's, but it took me a while-and it took really being in that community - to really learn that.

We have a man in our parish who happens to share a name with our Presiding Bishop. Our Michael Currie and our Presiding Bishop are both beloved of God, have deep prayer lives, and are a beacon of God's love and light to those who meet them. But, that's where the similarities end. Our Michael Currie is large, white and uneducated. He can't read or tell time. He lives independently, but just barely. And he has a firm, unshakable faith in God, Jesus, Mary, Santa Claus, and Elvis. I love him; we Jove him. He is the face of Christ for us every week.

Michael didn't grow up in the Episcopal Church and he lacks the capacity to pick up on the subtle, unspoken norms of Episcopal worship. He doesn't understand that the movement to the altar rail for Communion isn't a race. He doesn't understand that the children's sermons are really intended for the small humans. He doesn't understand that we keep our prayers silent, or from the book for most of the service. (I would, and have, said all of this in front of him. We like to laugh together.)

One Sunday, in my first year of ministry at St. Matthew's, Michael was particularly verbal during the service. Nothing inappropriate -just out-loud prayers where wenormally wouldn't offer them. It was clear that he was nervous and worked up and was working that out in community through prayer -and really wasn't catching on to our unspoken norms.

After the service, I braced myself for the fall-out. As I headed back to coffee hour, I steeled myself for the onslaught of criticism. The story I was telling myself was that I was going to get raked over the coals for this. I was scripting it in my head, "Mother Carrie, did you HEAR Michael today?!? What are you going to do about that? How are you going to fix this??!?"

At coffee hour, I was approached independently by two men. The first one came up to me and said, "Mother Carrie, I noticed that Michael was a little wound up today." I braced myself.

"What can we do to help?" He graciously offered.

And then another man approached me, and this time I was ready—you don't get two free passes right in a row.

He said, "I noticed Michael seemed pretty upset today." "What do you think we can do to help him out?"

After I caught my breath and successfully choked down tears of gratitude and relief, we talked about having parishioners sit right next to Michael and lead him through the

service, to speak the silent nuances aloud when appropriate and he wouldn't feel so alone. We still do that, even all these years later.

We learned, together, how to care for God's beloved Michael in our midst, who understands the world so differently than we do. We learned together how to make our community a little closer to the Kingdom of God, where all are welcome, all are honored, all are loved, and all are fed.

At the same time, I learned the lesson that I would have to learn many more times after that, that the Church isn't always a place of blame and fixing. The community of St. Matthew's has given me a glimpse of the Kingdom of God where we all work together for the common good.

For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.

I'm sharing these stories from my own life-not because my life is more charmed with God stories-it's not. I'm sharing my stories in the hope that the Holy Spirit is stirring up in you your own memories and experiences of how God shows us his grace and blessing through community.

In this community of faithful Christians, I imagine us all lifting up to God, in gratitude, a multitude of stories about how God uses community to show forth his grace.

I think of St. Matthew's, Moravia-who have come together in ministry using the gifts that God has given them to lead their church in vitality and faithful service. They are a living example of the Body of Christ.

I think of St. Paul's, downtown Syracuse, who finds God in the diversity of their congregation where Sudanese refugees, local Syracusans, and many others are praying together, learning each other's languages and songs to serve the Kingdom better together.

I think of Grace and Holy Spirit, Cortland and Grace, Syracuse whose congregations have come together after fires in their buildings and found in their communities a place of refuge, hope, and courage. At the same time, rising from the ashes with even more passion and spark for ministry.

I think of the countless congregations in our midst that live out the loaves and fishes miracle week after week, month after month, year after year and turn a few scrappy volunteers and meager budgets into rich feasts where all are fed and welcome.

I think of the good people of St. Andrew's, New Berlin; St. Matthew's, South New Berlin and Emmanuel, Norwich who have endured the deep pain of the tragic, sudden loss of their priest and leader and have taken what they've learned, inspired by the Holy Spirit, to continue together in faith and hope, through the blessing of community.

I think of the faithful people of St. Thomas', North Syracuse, St. Paul's, Watertown and the churches in Phoenix, Utica, Jamesville, Cleveland, Syracuse, and in many other places that have had the courage to leave their buildings when the buildings no longer served them, or they couldn't afford to keep them, and through the power of God in community found the same steadfast God in new places, different buildings and with new communities.

Community is the basic unit of Christianity. Of course, we have our individual pieties, beliefs, and faith journeys, but there's something about the gift of community that helps us draw closer to the Kingdom of God.

Community is the only container I know that can hold the depths of human suffering and within it resides the capacity for healing.

Community is the best design I know of that can help us sit with the disillusionment of our times.

Parker Palmer, Quaker author and activist said, "I think that complexity can only be held by community."

Community is also the way we can do great things. Together we can do wonderful things for the Kingdom that we could never do alone.

It's a time when tensions are high and there's a lot at stake. For some of us, the stories we hear in our heads are ones of fear and anxiety about the future-the future of our churches, the future of our country and the future of our world. It's in times like this I'm grateful for the gift of community that surrounds us with loving presence and reassurance. I'm grateful for the gift of community that draws us together in the Body of Christ so that we can serve the world in Jesus' name. It's in community that we can heal and be made whole for service.
